

Woman Says She Is Unworthy of Husband and Commits

SASKATOON, May 11:-Leaving a note for her husband, W. A. Wilson, traveller for an oil company, stating that she was unworthy of him and asking his largiveness for her act, Mrs. Murel Wilson took her four children, ranging in ages from nine years to five months, to the banks of the Saskatchewan River two miles from the city Friday afternoon and killed them by strangulation and then committed suicide by hanging herself.
