NOISE CAUSES MENTAL ILLS

So Says Dr. A. L. Crease, Superintendent of Essondale

VANCOUVER, Dec. 27.-Noise an important contributor to mental 1923 FORD SEDAN ailments, according to Dr. A. L. Crease, medical superintendent of the Essondale mental hospital. The effect of noise is fatigue, he says fatigue caused from an extra tension of nerves and muscles.

"Nervous tension in an atmosphere of noise is a state unconsciously assumed, but it is never-theless real," declared Dr. Crease. nervous system and it produces

Dr.. Crease claimed noise was in large degree responsible for nervous conditions resulting in inability to obtain sleep of the necessary intensity. A man or woman could be asleep or in a state of unconsciousness, yet, if noise were present, proper rest and recuperation could in the case of a person who had become so accustomed to going to sleep in an atmosphere of noise that he could lapse into unconsciousness

lalmost immediately.
Care was taken at the Essondale hospital, Dr. Crease pointed out, to eliminate noise wherever possible and in this connection insulating materials had been used in construction of the buildings. That the value of silence, so long recognized in hospitals and by the medical profession, is being more and more reized by business and industry is proven by the rapidly developing opinion against noise.
