

One of the finest harbors in the world. The largest fresh halibut business in the world. The largest fish cold storage plant in the world.

A large, strictly modern drydock and shipbuilding plant. A grain elevator leased to the Alberta Wheat Pool with capacity of 1,250,000 bushels.

A large, modern ocean dock.

A new modern lumber mill, planing and shingle mills and box factory with capacity output of 60,000 board feet daily. Fish reduction plant.

A new mill at Porpoise Harbor and another building alongside it seven miles from the city.

Railway shops employing about 75 men.
