## Dominion Government Policy In Regard to Tariff Set Out by by Hon. Jas. Malcolm in Speech

Answers Hon. R. B. Bennett, Leader of the Opposition, Showing How Canadian Business Is Affected

TARA, Ont., June 29.—"If changes are made in the United States tariff which are found to be detrimental to the interests of Canada, alterations in the Canadian tariff structure to correct the situation will unquestionably be made," Hon. James Malcolm, minister of trade and commerce, said during an address here yesterday in which he replied to criticisms made by Hon. R. B. Bennett, K.C., Conservative leader, of the government's tariff policy. "The government is much more alive to the situation than is the leader of the opposition and is fully prepared in the interests of Canada to readjust its fiscal policy from time to time to meet any changes that may take place in the tariff structure of the United States or any other country."

Referring to the demand of Mr. Bennett for an Empire trade conference, Mr. Malcolm stated that ever since the late Rt. Hon. W. S. Fielding had introduced the British preference, it had been the Liberal policy to increase trade

VANCOUVER, June 29.—Members of the farmers' institutes of British Columbia here yesterday elected O. B. Appleton of Procter president in place of James Bailey of Chilliwack, resigned, and A. B. Smith of Cranbrook, secretary in place of C. E. Whitney Griffith of Victoria.

It was announced that the new secretary would serve without salary. It was claimed that Whitney Griffith had received in honorariums and expenses nearly \$4000 a year for taking care of the secretarial work.

## RESCUED BY THE BRITISH

Spanish Aviators Picked Up After Being Lost for Week in Atlantic

MADRID, June 29.—After being missing for more than a week, the Spanish transatlantic aviators, Major Ramon Franco and three companions, were picked up at sea by the British airplane carrier Eagle and were being brought to Gibraltar today.

The aviators started June 22 for America via the Azores and the rescue was made 100 miles northwest of San Miguel Island, the nearest to Europe of the Azores group.

## Major McPherson of Point Grey Dismissed for Spending Public Money on Privately Owned Land

VICTORIA, June 29.—The cabinet Friday dismissed Major H. L. McPherson, official in charge of administration of the Government lands in the University of British Columbia at Point Grey, after A. N. Daykin, special commissioner, made an interim report, finding in effect that Government funds had been improperly used on the development of privately owned property and shown as expenditures on Government land.

The specific case of a privately owned golf course was stressed in which it was said \$8800 had been spent. The report said there were smaller expenditures on other smaller private properties.

The Government will seek to secure restitution of the funds improperly spent, but further action must await the filing of the final report by Mr. Daykin.

The interim report stated that Major McPherson said under oath that the Government money was spent on privately owned land and that the vouchers showed expenditures as having been made on unit three.

Major McPherson denied any intention to deceive the lands department.

VICTORIA, June 29. — A. N. Daykin, commissioner investigating the administration of the Government's university subdivision at Point Grey, was given complete charge of this area by the cabinet yesterday.

Action Explained  
VANCOUVER, June 29.—John Boyd, president of the General Construction Co., one of the chief backers of the golf course near the entrance to the University of British Columbia area, said today that the work done by the Government employees and Government money was in fulfillment of a moral obligation on the part of the lessors to hand over 120 acres of the tract cleared of the original stand of timber stumps.

## HON. J. A. ROBB TO VISIT CITY

Federal Minister of Finance Due Here on July 16 En Route to Skagway

For the first time in the last few years, Prince Rupert will receive a visit from a federal cabinet minister when Hon. James A. Robb, minister of finance, comes here aboard the steamer Princess Louise on July 15, making the trip to Skagway with a party of friends.

Apart from the mere fact that he will be here on that date, little information has been received locally as to the details of the minister's itinerary or the length of time he may stay here. It will be the first time that Mr. Robb has visited Prince Rupert.

FIRST SALMON OF SEASON SHIPPED  
The season's first shipment of fresh canned salmon from District No. 2 went south last night aboard the Union steamer Cardena. It consisted of 500 cases consigned from Wales Island cannery to Vancouver. There is reported to be a good run of sockeye in the Naas River division and the Wales Island cannery is getting a good pack so far.

## International Peace Engages Governments; U.S. Would Go Slow

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Suggestions have been made by the United States Government to Great Britain that the naval disarmament question be approached with caution, in view of the present status of that problem. There is a feeling of uneasiness in official circles here that the conference of naval powers might result in failure without sufficient preparation.

The United States Government had been informally sounded out by Great Britain, it became known yesterday, on its attitude toward a conference of the principal naval powers, either separate from the League of Nations or under league machinery.

LONDON, June 29.—Premier Ramsay Macdonald in a public speech he made here last night said his Government was actively working at its great task of international peace. "Right up to the moment I left Downing Street to come here I was engaged in trying to lay the foundations of what will be the finest and fairest fabric of any government ever built for the delight and comfort of the nation for which it was responsible," he said.

## NEW TITLES IN BRITAIN

Viscount Peel, Sir W. Joynson Hicks and Hamar Greenwood Among Those Honored

LONDON, June 29.—The honor list conferred by the King in connection with the resignation of Stanley Baldwin as prime minister was issued last night. It is not unduly long, nor does it contain many surprises.

Viscount Peel, former secretary of state for India, who was in Canada last year as head of the contingent of parliamentarians, is raised to an earldom. Sir William Joynson Hicks, late home secretary, becomes a viscount. Hon. Hamar Greenwood, a native of Whitby, Ont., and the last man to occupy the position of secretary of state for Ireland in the British Government, has been made a baron.

## CAR ACCIDENT ON ISLAND HIGHWAY

Automobile Almost Demolished Thursday Night and Occupants Escaped Miraculously

What might have been a serious accident, as far as the persons involved were concerned, was miraculously averted about 11 o'clock Thursday night when a taxi car driven by Lyle Marr and occupied by five of his friends went over a precipitous bank on the Kaien Island highway about a mile and a half beyond the city limits. Marr was driving toward the city and failed to make a rather sharp curve, the car turning over and going over the side with all its occupants still inside. The vehicle was badly wrecked and one of the occupants suffered broken ribs, the others getting off with the shaking up.
