FORMER CITY OFFICIAL IS APPRECIATED

Victoria Daily Times Speaks of Ability of E. D. Johnson Who Left Here Recently.

The Victoria Daily Times has an appreciative article on the appointment of Ernest D. Johnson, formerly city treasurer of Prince Rupert. It says:—

Mr. Johnson is a native of Cheltenham, England, and was educated there, later taking a course in the Royal Agricultural College, Cirencester. In the earlier years after leaving college he was with one of the largest grain merchants in the United Kingdom, and for four years after that was inspector of branches attached to the Treasury Department. He came to Canada nineteen years ago, and farmed for four years.

Mr. Johnson then accepted an invitation from Frank Morse, at that time general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and joined its staff in charge of the pay rolls, and later, as travelling accountant in charge of construction distribution.

Went to Rupert.

Nine years ago he was moved to Prince Rupert in charge of accounts there and was also paymaster of the mountain division. While there, he originated methods of accounting which remain the standard in use by the company.

In February, 1913, Mr. Johnson was selected by the Prince Rupert City Council for the position of auditor and reorganized the accounting system, following which he was appointed city treasurer. In that office he has remodelled the city's entire debenture debt, saving the taxpayers \$1,000,000 during the lifetime of the debentures.

His scheme in this regard received high commendation from the general manager of the Bank of Montreal and eastern bond houses. The finances of the city were thus placed on a sound and permanent basis.

Well Known Figure.

Mr. Johnson has always been a prominent figure in the Union of B. C. Municipalities as an authority on municipal financing, and he has been a member of the committee on that subject at several of the Union's annual conventions.

In addition to making a deep study of taxation in all its phases and its fiscal results and has opportunities of studying these problems in their practical working out in many large cities, notably in New York.

All his experience has been in large departmental work and the positions he has held have been chiefly executive. In the forthcoming consolidation of the Municipal Act and in the conferences which are shortly to take place, in accordance with the promises of the Premier and the Minister of Finance, with respect to municipal and provincial sources of taxation, Mr. Johnson's knowledge and experience are expected to be of especial value.

A Wide Choice.

It is understood that there were an unusually large number of applicants for this new position, and these have been receiving the most careful consideration from the Minister of Finance and the Civil Service Commissioner for some time past. In making the recommendation they do to the
