HANSON OPENS BOOMING YARD

Development of Pole Business in Interior Necessitates New Assembly Place at Nash

The Hanson Lumber & Timber Co. has a large number of men employed in the establishment of its second extensive pole assembly yard on the Skeena River. Nash, up the river from Cedarvale, has been selected as the site for the new yard and there is much activity there as the grounds are being cleared and the logs fashioned to throw across the Skeena in time for the spring drive. The rapid development of the pole business on the Skeena has resulted in the clogging of the big yard at Cedarvale and the booming field has been unable to cope with the poles rushed down in the spring drive following a busy season in the woods. The opening up of the Bell Lake limits near Hazelton as the supply for increased export orders has necessitated the new yard closer to the scene.

PRESIDENT OF GRANBY CO. PASSES IN EAST

Col. J. T. Crabbs Was Known in This District Through Having Been Frequent Visitor

Col. J. T. Crabbs, president of the Granby Consolidated Co. and frequent visitor to this coast since his connection with the smelting firm in 1919, died at New York on Monday.

Col. Crabbs spent many years in the United States army, receiving his rank of colonel during the Roosevelt regime. He retired from the ranks shortly after President Roosevelt left office, reentered the service during the late war, when he supervised powder manufacturing for the United States government. In 1919 he joined the directorate of the Granby company as vice-president, being elected president in 1921.
