URGES ABOLITION OF PRIVILEGES OF NATIVES

Gives In Detail Loss To Commercial Fishing as Result of Indians Taking Spawning Fish On Spawning Grounds

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4.—The stupendous loss of 240,-000 sockeye or the equivalent of 400,000,000 eggs was suffered this year as a result of Indians fishing for food on the spawning grounds of the Naas, Skeena and Upper Fraser rivers, declared Richard Gosse, president of the B. C. Packers, in an appeal for abolition of the Indian privileges on the spawning grounds. The appeal was made to W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries, at a conference with members of the fishing

DISCUSSED

Proposal to Close Certain Areas to Purse Seines Met Strong Opposition

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4:-Proposals to amend the fisheries regulations for the season 1930 in the waters of British Columbia advanced by W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries, at a conference here yesterday met with strong opposition from representatives of purse seine fishermen and canners.

The proposed amendments are chiefly concerned with the prohibition of salmon seining within certain areas

with a view to conservation. "If the department really intends these regulations to go into force, the fishermen and canners might just as well shut up shop and go into the lumbering business," said R. C. Gosse.

Handsome Power Cruiser Naskeena For Indian Department Now Due From Vancouver

Having left Vancouver last Wednesday, the new power cruiser Naskeena, for the use of the local Indian Agency, is expected to arrive in Prince Rupert any time now. The vessel is being brought up the coast by Capt. D. Barry of Vancouver, who will deliver her to the local Indian Agent, W. E. Collison.

The Naskeena, which was built at Mensions shipyard in Vancouver, is a very handsome and well appointed craft. Of raised deck type with pilot house above the deck, the vessel is 55 feet long with beam of 12 feet six inches and a draft of five * reet. A 60 h.p. Frisco-Standard full * liesel engine gives her a cruising
