# To the Ratepayers of the City of Prince Rupert: Re Proposed New School

We, the undersigned members of the Prince Rupert Board of School Trustees desire to draw the attention of the Prince Rupert ratepayers to our reasons for recommending that a permanent public school building, costing approximately \$135,000, be erected on Acropolis Hill.

(A) As to the site, our reasons for choosing Acropolis Hill are:

1. Two-thirds of the school children now attending school live to the south of McBride Street, according to figures supplied by the public school principal. The one-third living north of McBride already have the King Edward School.

**For Section 2.**  
2. It is necessary to have a public school building which will accommodate the school children from the southerly parts of Section One and any from Section 2, and Acropolis Hill will be central for years to come until it is necessary to build a school in Section 2.

3. The only other school-site at all centrally situated for the present school-going children is the Ninth Avenue site, and the medical authorities advise against this site as being unhealthy in comparison with Acropolis Hill.

4. Acropolis Hill already has a \$35,000 playground which will be available for the Acropolis School House and this asset alone should win universal support for the Acropolis site, as it is impossible to make a good playground of sufficient size on the Ninth Avenue site.

**Only Suitable Site.**  
5. The only other available site is the school reserve near Hays Creek, but this is only several blocks from the King Edward School, and it would be manifestly unfair to erect another public school so near the King Edward, and force children from the southerly limits of the city to go so far. Moreover, the Hays Creek site is a very central one for the townsite as a whole, and for that reason should be retained for the site of our future High School.

6. If we look at a map of the townsite, it will be seen that schools built, one in Sec. 2, one on Acropolis Hill, one on the present King Edward School site and one where the present Seal Cove School is, will divide the townsite from south to north in approximately equal distances, and looking to the future, this is as it should be.

**Protect Children.**  
7. Answering the objection that Acropolis Hill is difficult for little children to climb in rough weather, we propose erecting a hand rail from the bottom of the hill, which will assist the children in windy weather, and in any event the climb is only several hundred yards further than they have at present to go on Borden Street.

8. Answering the objection that there will not be good water pressure in case of fire, it is our purpose to install an electric pump to give this pressure, this pump only to be used in case of fire. A tank under the roof will provide sufficient force for water supply in the school. The city engineer and our architect have both declared this to be feasible.

Finally, it is impossible to secure a site which has no objectionable features, and in criticising the Acropolis Hill site the above reasons must all be considered, and though the majority of this Board were at first against the Acropolis site, it is now unanimous in its favor after a

great deal of careful thought and consideration.

**Should be Permanent.**

(B) As to the erection of a permanent building, our reasons are: We should have a permanent structure erected out of brick, hollow tile, stone, concrete or a combination of these, for the reason that the city can obtain thirty to forty years to repay the bond issue which will make the payments very light upon the present ratepayers; lighter in fact than the payments for a frame structure, the bonds for which would have to be redeemed in ten years' time.

For this and other reasons, Mr. Johnson, the present city treasurer, who is an authority on these matters, strongly recommends the building of a permanent and not a frame building.

**Needed at Once.**  
We need a schoolhouse of 12 class-rooms for the reason that we will be able to fill at least eight class-rooms as soon as the school is ready for occupancy and we should have a few rooms in reserve so that we shall not be compelled to build another school as soon as we have this one completed, which will be our predicament if we build a temporary six or eight room frame structure as some have suggested. At the present time we have all the available room taken in the Borden Street High School, and we will, in September, have at least three class-rooms rented outside of our schools and scattered about the city, with the consequent injury to the health of the pupils caused by inadequate lighting and ventilation of these places. Without a twelve-room schoolhouse we will be unable to cope with any reasonable increase in the population of the city.

**Cost of Wood.**  
The architects have advised us that a twelve-room frame school house will cost approximately \$100,000, as against \$135,000 for a permanent school building, and the city treasurer has shown us that the annual payments to be made for this frame building will be considerably greater than for the permanent building, for the reason above stated. Mr. Johnson states that the carrying charges for this permanent school (reckoned at \$150,000) will only amount to an added three-quarters of a mill to our tax rate, while a frame structure at \$100,000 would mean an added 1 1/2 mills to the tax rate.

In a permanent building we will have greater security from fire, and much less cost for fire insurance, repairs and general upkeep, and we think the time has come when, as a city, we should commence to get away from so much temporary, make-shift erections, and thus avoid the necessity of having to be continually renovating and rebuilding as the old temporary structures become dilapidated.

**Defeat Detrimental.**

Finally, we desire to impress upon the Prince Rupert ratepayers, in the most forcible manner, that the defeat of the present Bylaw will result in a delay detrimental to the best interests of public school education in the city. The school physician is already complaining about the effects upon the eyes of the children of the rented temporary premises now in use, and as the school population is steadily fast increasing the situation, from the standpoint of school room accommodation, will be desperate before the new building can be utilized.

We urge the ratepayers, therefore, to give this Bylaw their solid, loyal support, and thus show the rest of the province Prince Rupert's attitude towards education facilities.
