Universal Desire For Peace Will Aid Solution of Naval Power Question-Macdonald

GENEVA, Sept. 5. — The tremendous desire for Peace shared by ninety-five per cent of all peoples on earth will enable President Hoover of the United States and the British prime minister to solve the naval power problem, Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay Macdonald said at a League of Nations luncheon here today. He added his conviction that no consideration of national interests would dominate them or cause them to risk failure.

"We have our difficulties, to be sure, and there are things intricate in character to be settled, but the will of the people is more powerful than all else and in the end it must be the last word," the British premier declared.
