## SIR JOHN AIRD OPTIMISTIC

TORONTO, Jan. 8.—Addressing the annual meeting of the Canadian Bank of Commerce today Sir John Aird in his presidential address predicted that unless Canada failed to profit by the warnings of experience, he saw no reason why the prosperity of 1929 should not equal or surpass that of 1928. He coupled with this, however, the observation that pulp and paper products was the one "dark spot on the horizon," and issued a warning that banks and financial houses do all in their power to "restrain speculative tendencies within reasonable bounds."

Leo Lomski, the "Aberdeen assassin," will meet James J. Braddock, conqueror of Tuffy Griffiths, in Madison Square Garden, New York, January 18.

Eddie Eicher, Lomski's manager expresses the opinion that Leo will fall heir to the light heavy-weight crown without again meeting Tommy Loughran. Eicher says Lomski posted a challenge and \$2500 forfeit with the New York State Boxing Commission nine months ago and that since Loughran has shown no inclination to return from the heavy-weight ranks, precedent would indicate that Lomski was entitled to the crown. He cited the similar instance of Jack Delaney's departure from the division and the passing of the title to Mike McTigue when Delaney failed to box in his class.

## APPROVES MOVEMENT OF CANADIANS HOME

(Edmonton Bulletin) During the first eight months of the present fiscal year, 25,801 Canadians returned from the United States to make their homes in Canada. These figures include only those who had gone to the United States with the declared intention of remaining there. That is one feature of the present immigration movement which must have the unqualified approval of the Canadian public. The more so as conditions in Canada are now such that the returning wanderers will find it easy to make places for themselves and to secure interests here which will hold them permanently.

## BEAT RECORDS IN ENDURANCE

Plane Remained in Air for Six Nights and Nearly Seven Days

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8.—The army endurance flight plane Question Mark landed seven minutes one second after two yesterday afternoon after a record smashing flight of 150 hours 40 minutes 15 seconds. The ship was in the air continuously six nights and nearly seven days following the take-off on New Year's morning. The plane was eventually forced down by engine trouble.

Portland scored one in each of the first and third periods. Vancouver two in the second and two in the final.

## Around The World With Sport Fans

(By The Tramp) Many inquiries are being made of sports editors, these days, about the possibility of securing tickets in the Calcutta Sweepstakes conducted in connection with the English Derby, the great Old Country racing classic run annually at Epsom Downs, says a sports writer for the Edmonton Bulletin.

The Calcutta Sweepstakes is the largest "sweep" of its kind in the world. Something like a quarter of a million tickets are circulated throughout the world, each selling for one pound. The London Stock Exchange Sweepstakes is a smaller venture, conducted along similar lines.

But there are no agents selling chances on either "sweep"—either in this country or the old land. The Calcutta enterprise is promoted by the Calcutta Club, of India, and composed of British government officials in India or men who were formerly in such positions. The London Stock Exchange Sweepstake is conducted by the members of that famous exchange.

The entire issue of tickets is allotted to the members of the two organizations. They may dispose of them as they see fit. But there is no public sale and chances may only be secured through some connection with a member.

## MARKETING ACT IS SUSTAINED

VICTORIA, Jan. 8.—The B. C. Produce Marketing Act, so far as it concerns shipment inside and outside the province, was sustained by the British Columbia Court of Appeals in handing down its judgments. The crown was successful in Rex vs Sales Service Ltd., Rex vs Associated Growers of B. C. Ltd. and Rex vs Wong Kit, the appeals having been made by the crown against rulings of Mr. Justice M. A. McDonald that, although the Act was intra vires, it did not apply to shipments outside the province.

The appeal of Chung Chuck against a conviction for infraction of the Act was dismissed. This appeal was based on the ground that the Act was ultra vires of the legislature.

## The Letter Box

### THAT HOLD-BACK

Editor, Daily News:—In regard to the editorial contained in your issue of the 7th inst. respecting a proposed "hold-back" as you term it of \$150,000. in a trust fund for twenty years, you seem to be under a misapprehension as to the object of the proposed clause in the agreement.

This clause was inserted on the advice of the City Solicitor who informed the Council that all the ratable property in the City is pledged as security for all the debentures issued by the City since its incorporation for any purpose and that there has been no segregation of any particular assets for the purpose of securing debentures issued for the construction of the hydro-electric. As a consequence of this fact, and it being impossible for the city to secure a release from the other bond holders of their claims against the hydro-electric there seems to be no other solution of the difficulty, and the only method which seems feasible is the one which has been suggested.

I think this explanation makes it quite clear that this trust fund is for the protection of the bond holders.
