**Matters Affecting Hospital to Be

E. S. H. Winn**

At the suggestion of Ald. S. D. Macdonald, the hospital board last night named James H. Thompson president and H. W. Birch, managing secretary, a committee to take up with E. S. H. Winn, chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board, while he is here next week, matters under the act affecting the hospital.

One of the complaints made by the hospital is that treatment is often given patients under the act in the hospital pay-cent for which cannot be recovered from the board. For instance, not long ago an injured man came in for x-ray treatment and was also a patient for 12 days in the institution. The hospital had been able to collect from the board only for the x-ray. 
