Canada to be Directly Represented at Five-Power Naval Conference States Ramsay MacDonald Today

Nothing Affecting Canada Will Be Done Without Her Full Knowledge and Consent Declares Britain's Premier

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—"Canada will be represented at the five-power conference in January by her own delegates, as will other entities of the British Commonwealth."

"No arrangements which are binding on Canada will be entered into without the knowledge and consent of this Dominion."

"Final agreements in respect to the disarmament problem depend entirely on the London five-power conference."

Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay Macdonald, prime minister of Great Britain, made these statements to newspapermen following his arrival today from Toronto.

When his attention was drawn to despatches intimating that he would take up the question of demilitarization of Halifax with Premier Mackenzie King, he replied: "I would suggest that you take those despatches with a large grain of salt. I do not just know what Premier King and I will discuss."
