## Prince Rupert Won all the Basketball Games from Anyox Teams

### Senior and Ladies' Games Were Particularly Well Contested and Outcome Was in Doubt Right to End; Play Again Tonight

Prince Rupert won all three games of the inter-town basketball series with Anyox. The ladies' senior and men's senior were games that caused real excitement among the large number of spectators. The basketball fans were treated to some fast, hard and clean fought contests and many of the fans stated their intention of witnessing the final games tonight. The Native Sons, playing good combination with hard play, were able to defeat the Anyox seniors 25-20. The Rupert ladies' senior team won from the Anyox seniors with a last-minute rally, when they scored five points, winning 17-14. The High School team defeated the Anyox Intermediates 22-5 in a well played game, but which lacked the excitement of the two senior games.

#### Senior Game

The Native Sons, playing an uphill game most of the time, were able to emerge victorious only by playing hard and putting all their energy into the game during the last five minutes. The Anyox seniors with steady plays and good combination were able to hold the lead from the first up to the last five minutes, when the Sons seemed to have found that extra bit of stamina that was required to win the game. #### Prospect of Heavy Arrivals During Next Few Days Causes Slump in Bidding

With prospects of heavy offerings of initial catches of the season within the next few days, halibut prices took a disappointing drop at the local Fish Exchange this morning when a total of 167,000 pounds was sold not including the 45,000 pound catch of the American schooner Aleutian which decided to go on to Seattle in the hope of obtaining better prices. Five American vessels sold a total of 132,000 pounds at 13.5c and 7c to 13.7c and 7c while five Canadian vessels received 11c and 6c to 11.5c and 6c for 35,000 pounds.
