HARD BLOW TO CREDIT

Liability of English Firm Something Like Hundred Million

LONDON, Oct. 16 (by Mail):-With liabilities estimated at \$100, 000,000 and assets that are largely problematical, the failure of the Hatry group of companies is by far the worst blow suffered by the London Stock Exchange for over half a century. But heavy though it is the financial loss is not the weightiest part of the calamity. Hatry and his associates have surrendered themselves to the authorities and are now the subject of a state prosecution. The charges against them, as formulated by the Crown, involve the forgery and uttering of scrip certificates to enormous amounts.

"Such transactions," said counsel, in opening the case for the Director of Public Prosecutions. "deliberately carried out in the City of London by persons entrusted with the issuing of loans to municipal corporations is, I believe, unprecedented."
