

Local Radio Man Heard Commander Byrd Talking in the Antarctic Regions

Making a record in radio reception here, Dave Eastman of this city picked up a message from Commander Byrd, who is now in the Antarctic. The message was sent to Pittsburgh short wave station KDKA from Commander Byrd's station WCST. The message mentioned that they were doing well, mentioned the names of a number of the men and told of having discovered some new land there.

Mr. Eastman uses a short wave receiving set that he made himself and which he has operated for the past two years. He says he has given up using his long wave set because he gets so much better results from the other. It is not so much affected by weather conditions and static. Among stations he has heard at different times have been Malabar, Java; Eiffel Tower, Paris; and the Australian and Japanese stations. It is quite a regular thing to hear Moscow. He says that the call letters are always given in English as well as the native tongue and some of the broadcasts are in broken English.

Another advantage of the short wave set is the fact that it can be used all day as well as at night. All last week when owners of long wave sets were getting no results, the short wave broadcasts were coming in as
