## Kolchak Government Crisis In Russia is Expected Soon; Japanese are at Vladivostok

### British Soldiers Mutiny Because They Thought Were Being Sent to Russia; Bolsheviki Being Driven Back; Ukrainian and Roumanian Forces Acting in Conjunction.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, August 25.—Vladivostok is surrounded by insurgents and the town is filled with refugees, according to Bolshevik wireless. A Japanese squadron has arrived at Vladivostok.  
Washington, August 25.—Ambassador Morris who was sent to the United States department from Tokio to Omsk to report on the conditions in Siberia has advised the Government that the next thirty days will probably see a crisis in the affairs of the Kolchak Government.  
Berne—Thursday—According to latest reports from Ukraine, the Bolsheviki have been everywhere driven back by the Ukrainian and Roumanian forces acting in conjunction.  
London, August 25.—Three hundred soldiers of the Warwick, Berkshire, and Gloucester regiments have been arrested for refusing to obey orders to embark for France. The soldiers for the most part objected to embarking because they heard they would be sent to the Black Sea after arrival in France, whereas they had received promises no one would be sent to Russia unless they volunteered.  
The war office statement says the men were being sent to Turkey, not to Russia.

## COMMITTEE OF SENATE VOTES TREATY CHANGE

Would Amend Document to Make Shantung Returnable to China.

Washington, August 25.—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted 9 to 8 to strike out the word "Japan" from the provisions of the Peace Treaty relating to the disposition of Germany's rights in Shantung and insert in its place the word "China." In effect the amendment is to provide for the return of the territory to China.

## Is Charged With Having Betrayed Miss Edith Cavell

### Defence of Quien Will Ask that Case Await Trial of Former Kaiser And others Primarily Responsible.

Paris, August 25.—George Gaston Quien, charged with having intelligence with the enemy and alleged to have betrayed Edith Cavell, appears before the Sixth Council of Paris today.  
The prosecution claims that they will prove that after obtaining funds and help from Nurse Cavell he went to Holland and returned to Brussels as a German agent and betrayed her to the German commandant.  
The attorney for the defence will ask for an indefinite postponement until such time "as the Kaiser and other parties primarily responsible for the death of Miss Cavell be brought before an international tribunal."

## PRINCE NIKOLAI IS NOW HEIR APPARENT ROUMANIAN THRONE

Paris, Aug. 25.—Prince Nikolai has been officially recognized as heir apparent to the throne of Roumania in place of Prince Charles, who renounced his rights a few days ago.

## SUGAR SHORTAGE IS VERY ACUTE

## THREW GLASS, MONTH IN JAIL

### Geo. McAuley Convicted on Charge of Assault and Has to Pay Penalty.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMorde, Geo. McAuley, charged with assault, was sentenced to one month imprisonment with hard labor. On Saturday evening, according to the evidence, the accused had entered one of the pool rooms in a drink-crazed condition and had thrown a beer glass at the barmaid, Miss Hazel Raine, who appeared in the court this morning with a sore nose and forehead.  
L. W. Patmore, who appeared for the defence, asked for a light sentence, but the magistrate stated that hitting a woman was too serious a crime to be allowed to go with a simple fine even on the possible excuse that he was irresponsible for his actions on account of his condition.

## HIGHER PRICE FOR HALIBUT

### Thirteen Cents Paid for First Class Fish on Exchange and Nine Cents for Second.

The bidding for the fish which was up for sale at the local exchange was very keen yesterday. Prices soared over the 13 cents mark for first class and almost 9 1/2 for the second class. This is much higher than has been paid for some time and those fishermen who were fortunate in being in for the big price were very free with their cigars towards the end of the sale. The highest prices of the day were paid to the Advance, Marguerite and Agnes B.  
About six car loads in all were sold and the following catches made up the shipment: Yellowstone, 15,000; Nornen, 9,000; Star, 18,000; Reliance, 6,000; Lenor, 16,000; Hilda, 8,000; Ranier, 7,000; Helena, 9,000; Rennell, 8,000; Advance, 10,000; Marguerite, 7,000; Agnes B., 7,000; N. & S., 9,000; Tramp, 4,000; Gilford, 12,000, and Baker, 9,000 lbs.

## SHIPBUILDING IS ONCE MORE PROCEEDING

### R. Morgan Co. Once More Busy On the Slips and Requiring More Men on Job.

Work on the construction of the slips at the shipyards was recommenced this morning and J. R. Morgan, Ltd., are asking for men to work there. It is expected that this work will be pushed through to completion and that there will be a keel laying ceremony here in the near future.  
There is about two weeks more work to do on the new buildings at the shipyard, that work having gone ahead during the strike, while the excavation operations are tied up. Now the slips will be pushed up and it is possible that the first keel will be laid in three weeks from now.  
The steel is being unloaded from the cars, this work having proceeded with during the last week. The repair work is proceeding and the office staff is complete. Everything now seems to be business and Prince Rupert people will be glad to feel that this important industry is once more in full swing here.
