Is Charged With Having Betrayed Wiss Edith Cavell

Defence of Quien Will Ask that Case Await Trial of Former Kaiser And others Primarily Responsible.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, August 25.—George Gaston Quien, charged with having intelligence with the enemy and alleged to have betrayed Edith Caroll, appears before the Sixth Council of Paris today.

The prosecution claims that they will prove that after obtaining funds and help from Nurse Cavell he went to Holland and returned to Brussels as a German agent and betrayed her to the German commandant.

The attorney for the defense will ask for an indefinite postpot ament until such time "as the Kaiser and other parties primarily responsible for the death of Miss Cavell be brought before an international tribunal."
