Hon. S.L. Howe Points to Cod Fisheries North as Possible for Canada

Minister Deals With One of Great Sources of Wealth of British Columbia at Morning Session of Fisheries Convention

This morning a paper was read by Hon. S. L. Howe, commissioner of fisheries in the Provincial Government, which dealt with the value of the fisheries of British Coumbia and gave special attention to the salmon fisheries treaty between Canada and the United States which the Provincial Government endorses.

One striking feature of the paper was that which mentioned the desirability of Canada entering the cod fishing industry. Already the United States is year'y catching cod on the banks off the coast of Alaska and the Aleutian Islands and Canada has an equal right to the same fish. It suggests that there
