## Severe Earth Shock is Recorded at Victoria Probably Aleutians Five Men Due Here Today to Join the money to go to the Sal-

VICTORIA, Dec. 17-For six hours this morning, commencing shortly after 3 o'clock, the seismograph at Gonzales observatory recorded an earth disturbance which F. Napier Denison, the superintendent, described as the worst he has known there in years. It is believed the centre is 2600 miles from Victoria, either off the east coast of Kamchatka or the western tip of the Aleutian Islands.

Other points over the continent reported severe earthquake records, the east and west needle being shifted off the roll of film at Seattle.

It is recalled that the steamer Starr last week reported seven major volcanoes active along the Aleutian Penin-PROPERTY sula. Volcanic activity there is usually accompanied by heavy earth shocks.
