

**FREAKISH WEATHER IS RECORDED HERE**

**Snow Falls for Easter After High Wind and Heavy Rainfall Yesterday Afternoon**

Rather unusual weather conditions which have been experienced here of late culminated this morning in the ground being cov-

ered with an inch of snow which fell since midnight. Prospects are that Prince Rupert may have a white Easter whereas there was a green Christmas. However, it was rather unsettled this morning with the possibility that rain might soon come and make quick work of the snow. There has been a very fluctuating barometer during the past two or three days with rapid raises and falls. Yes-

terday afternoon the low mark of 28.98 was recorded at the Digby Island meteorological station and this morning the glass had jumped up to 29.78.

There was another gale yesterday afternoon, a maximum velocity of sixty miles per hour from the southeast being recorded. There was also heavy rainfall to add to the general unpleasantness of conditions.

**PASTOR SPEAKS TO GYRO CLUB**

**Rev. T. Ivon Jones Gives Thoughtful Address on His Impressions as New-comer Here**

A thoughtful address in the course of which he conveyed some of his impressions as a new-comer to Prince Rupert was given by Rev. T. Ivon Jones M. A. (Oxon), pastor of First Presbyterian Church, in addressing the Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday. He had come to the impression, he said, that people of this city were a companionable and kindly folk if by no other reason than that there were so many dogs here. The speaker compared the atmosphere and surroundings of Western Canada with those of England whence he had just come. England was a backward looking country, steeped and living in traditions of the past. On the other hand, the people of Canada were a forward looking people who lived and thought in the future. The ideal attitude, Mr. Jones felt might be a combination of the two with people not forgetful of the traditions and ideals of the past nor unmindful of what the future might hold in store. Likewise, people coming to a new community should bring with them something of the best of that place whither they came while at the same time, embracing new modes and ideals.

Mr. Jones alluded to the slogan of such clubs as Rotary and Gyro which was "service." That was an old word which was being used in this century in a new way by the service clubs. Its fountain head, however, had been at the Cross and it had had a long and honorable history since that time. The speaker urged that the "service" of today should not be made a soulless thing by separating it from that original source. The Christian Church should not be forgotten by those who became active in the service clubs and such organizations. The speaker acknowledged the tangible benefits such as the playgrounds for the children which the Gyro Club had provided for Prince Rupert.

At the conclusion of his address, Mr. Jones was thanked by President William Cruickshank who expressed the hope that he might again heard in the not distant future.

**RADIOPHONE BEING PLACED IN CANNERIES**

**Alaska Leading the Way in Installation of This Modern Convenience**

Alaska has again beaten out British Columbia. This time it is in regard to the installation of radiophones. One is being installed at Sunny Point Cannery, Ketchikan, and on the five vessels of their fleet. R. B. Weiss and a party of engineers are doing the work, for which a permit has been granted and a wave length is to be allocated to the station.

The equipment consists of receiving and sending apparatus which operates on a low wave length and enables the boats and canneries to communicate with each other. Five ships of the Nakat Packing Co. have been similarly equipped at Seattle, according to Weiss, who expects that when the Sunny Point office here is equipped, installations will be made at canneries at Chomley, McLeans Arm, Rose Inlet, Hidden Inlet and Union Bay for the Nakat concern, and at Quadra for the Northwest Fisheries. Weiss said that radio telephone equipment also would be installed at Port Althrop, Kake and Funter Bay for Skinner and Eddy.

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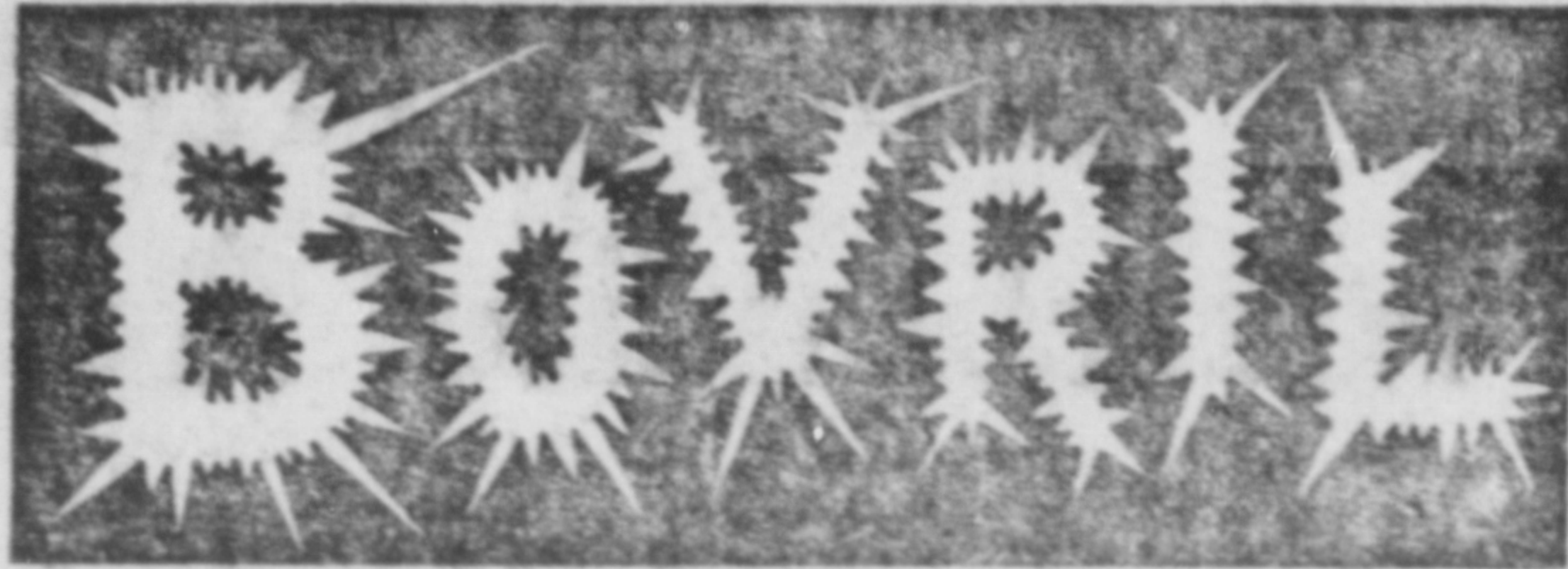

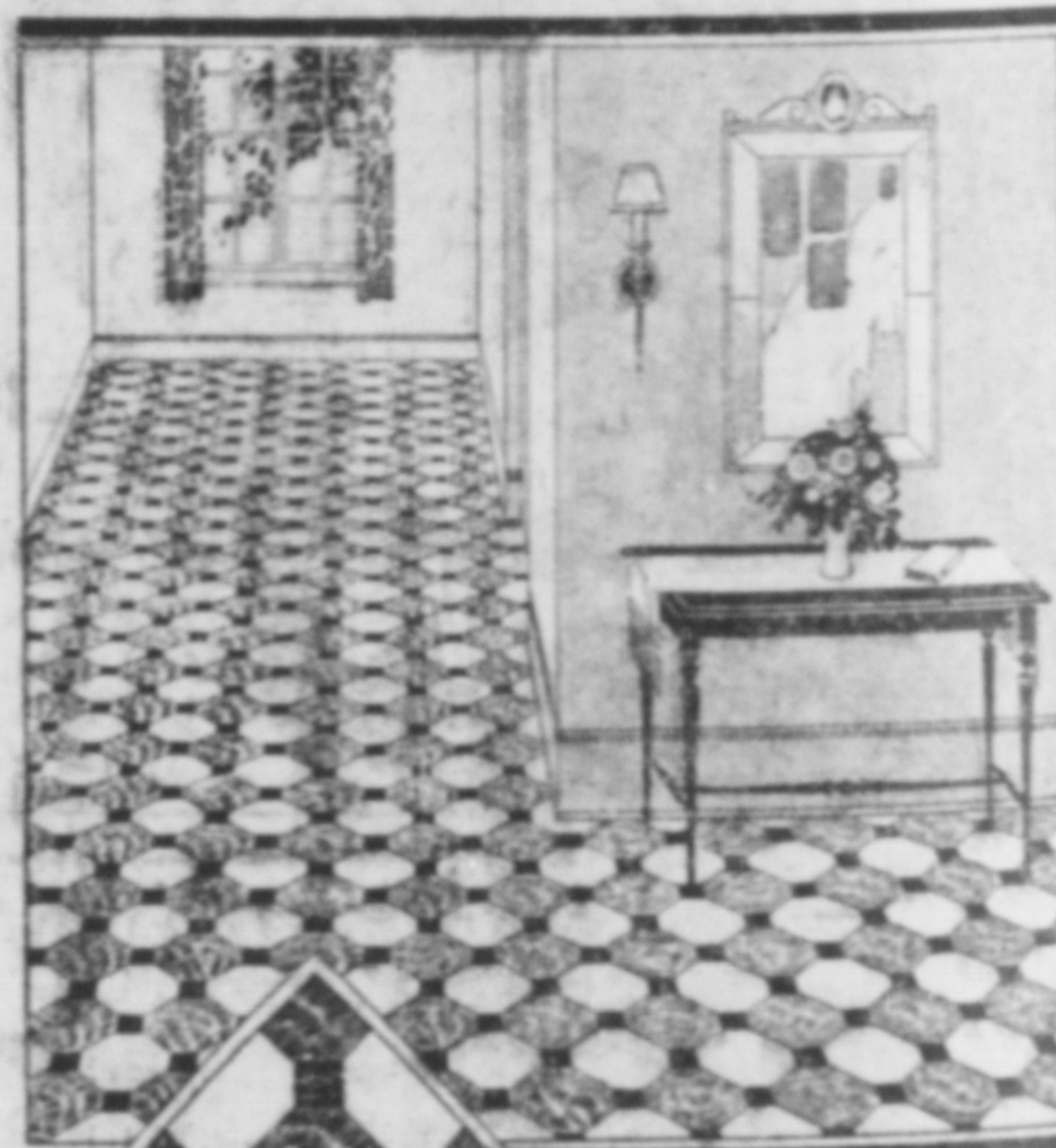
