# WASHINGTON CATHEDRAL BEING BUILT

Many Canadians Have Visited In United States Capitol

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8:-Hundreds of Canadians visiting here this summer have gone to Mount Saint Alban to admire the great pile which will be the Washington Cathedral. They have perhaps felt the sentiment expressed in a recent address made by Vincent Massey, the Canadian minister at the annual meeting of the National Cathedral Association. He said, "To those of us who have nurtured in English tradition this corner of your capital makes a peculiar appeal. As it happens there is a special affinity between Tuesday, October 8, 1929 your cathedral church and that of the diocese in which I live because the later bears the name which is so familiar in your cathedral close— that of St. Alban the




