Sensational Finish to The Pas 200 Mile Dog Derby Last Night St. Goddard Winning by 3 Min.

THE PAS, March 7.—In the most sensational finish ever witnessed in any dog derby, Emile St. Goddard, the youthful musher of international fame, last night finished first in the renewal of The Pas Dog Derby Association 200-mile non-stop derby. He crossed the finishing line at 11:09 p.m., his time for the 200 miles being 36 hours 59 minutes.

Art Brydges, another local entrant, came second, only three minutes behind St. Goddard. Completely exhausted, both the leading contestants fell across the finishing line. Both were so beaten by the raging frigid weather that they were unable to speak.

While St. Goddard won the local derby each year since 1925, this is the first win for him over a 200-mile route.

SEES MENACE CRICKET GAME

SYDNEY, Aus., Mar. 7.—"Wicked motives" are scented behind the recent test matches in Australia in which the best cricketers of Great Britain and the Commonwealth competed. It is the opinion of organized labor, as expressed in a manifesto of the Labor Council of New South Wales, that the test matches were organized through "the malevolent hand of capitalism."

"The great amount of interest taken in the test cricket matches between the English and Australian teams," says the Labor Council, "is indicative of the vast field open to the labor movement—a field which has hitherto been neglected—but which has been used by the employing class for the purpose of developing ideas and outlook inimical to the best interests of the working class movement."

"It must be remembered that sport, as well as art, is being utilized by the employing class for the purpose of building a psychology favorable to the continued existence of the present capitalist system of exploitation. Unfortunately it is the young who are always so taken. The agents of capitalism are quite well aware that the ideas implanted in youth are the hardest to eradicate."

"It is for this reason that the Boy Scout movement is supported, and the children of the workers attracted to these associations by promise of camping holidays, together with that of being patted on the back by some highly decorated person, whose only exertion is, in the main, living at the expense of the worker."

"It is time that the labor movement organized its own sports in its own way and kept them within the confines of the labor movement."

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK FELT

Japanese Vessels Off Aleutian Report They Felt Distinct Tremor Yesterday

CORDOVA, Alaska, Mar. 7.—A severe earthquake was felt yesterday on Japanese vessels south of the Aleutian Islands say reports received by the United States Naval radio station here. The shock, at 3:35 p.m., was felt also at Dutch Harbor.

Japanese vessels near the Island of Four Mountains reported the quake to be very severe, lasting about a minute.
