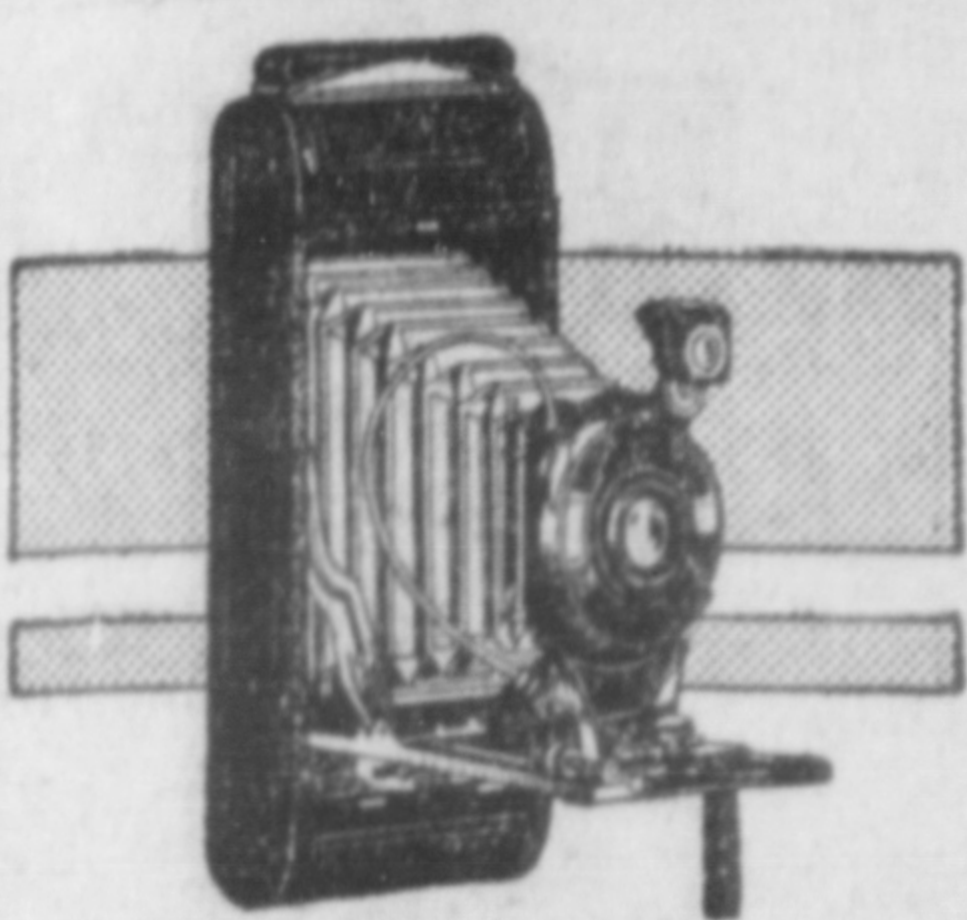

**ROTARY HEAD  
GIVES ADDRESS**

Emphasizes International Aspect  
of Club Work Speaking  
at Luncheon

"Rotary is an evolution," de-  
clared Dr. A. T. R. Cunningham  
in an address to the local Rotary  
Club at their weekly luncheon  
which was held at the Commo-  
dore Cafe Monday instead of  
Thursday.

Dr. Cunningham is the Gover-  
nor of Rotary District Number  
One which comprises Alaska,  
British Columbia, Washington  
and Oregon, probably the largest  
district on the continent. He is  
making a tour of the whole dis-  
trict visiting the clubs and carry-  
ing an inspirational message to  
the members.

In his address yesterday Dr.  
Cunningham spoke of the gra-  
dual change in the mission of  
Rotary and emphasized that this  
year the international aspect was  
particularly to the fore at a  
time when all the world is talk-  
ing of peace and improved in-  
ternational relationships.

George Bryant presided and  
there were several visitors pre-  
sent including Rev. H. R. Grant,  
formerly president of the club.

**DEPORTATION ASKED  
FOR PETER VEREGIN,  
HEAD OF DOUKHOBORS**

REGINA, July 30.—A demand  
has been made upon the Dominion  
government for the deportation of  
Peter Veregin, leader of the Chris-  
tian Community of Universal  
Brotherhood, more commonly  
known as the Doukhobors.

According to a despatch to the  
Morning Leader from Kamsack,  
Sask., it was learned that this de-  
mand has been made to Hon. Rob-  
ert Forke, minister of immigra-  
tion, and that the evidence upon  
which the citizens of Kamsack  
generally conclude Veregin to be  
an unfit citizen has been forward-  
ed to the department.

to Seek Legal Advice

Veregin passed through the  
town on the train for Winnipeg.  
He stated to some of his followers  
who met him that the reason for  
his visit to the Manitoba capital  
was to obtain legal advice as to  
the law in respect to parades, the  
clash between the Sons of Free-  
dom, of which Veregin is the head,  
and the townspeople a week ago  
being the reason for seeking this  
advice.

Earlier in the day he had ar-  
rived at his home in Veregin from  
Buchanan, and had held confer-  
ences with a number of his sect  
closest to him.

A few days ago, it is under-  
stood, a committee of citizens un-  
dertook to present to the federal  
department of immigration certain  
evidence which, they argue shows  
Veregin to be an undesirable citi-  
zen. It is charged against him  
that he is inciting his people to  
disregard the law of the country,  
that he is fomenting strife, and  
that in other ways he is a fit sub-  
ject for deportation.
