United States Apologizes For Firing At Canadian Liquor Boat Shawnee Fifteen Miles Off Shore

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The United States Government in a note to Canada has expressed its "regrets" for the firing by a coastguard patrol boat on the Canadian vessel Shawnee on September 11 off New York Harbor.

The communication was handed to Canadian Minister Massey in reply to a request by Canada for information concerning the incident. The apology of the United States contained the admission that the firing upon the

Reviewing the incident, the communication charged that the Shawnee was a vessel engaged in the smuggling of liquor and was built especially to violate American laws. The coastguard came upon the Shawnee some fifteen miles off the nearest land, and, after the vessel had ignored signals, the patrol boat fired five shells into her. The
