Radio Telephone Bill up For Second Reading and Proposal to Allow Sale of Game

VICTORIA, Feb. 14:- The companies act received a second reading in the Legislature yesterday. Minister of Public Works Lougheed explained the Ferry Act in its second reading to extend the time of the contract from five to ten years.. The second reading was also moved to ratify the agreement between the P.G.E. railway and West Vancouver.

The second reading of a private bill to incorporate the Northwest Telephone Company came up. This private bill gives the B. C. Telephone Co. the right to extend its system throughout the province by wireless.

A proposed amendment to the Game Act would allow the selling n the public market of game birds and a bill to amend the Civil Service act were passed through the committee.

A third reading of the bill will rectify irregularities in appointments said to have been made in the past in that an applicant for the appointment had not been made to pass an examination.
