ANNUAL MEETING OF FAIR BOARD HEARD REPORTS AND NOMINATED BOARD FOR THE COMING SEASON.

door entertainment is featured, and I am of the opinion that had weather conditions been satisfactory during 1928 exhibition, we would have shown a larger balance. However, it is gratifying to be able to report that we show a favorable balance.

"We found the business people and citizens generally generous, as usual. The city donated \$1200, and also a lot, the proceeds from the sale of tickets for the lot being very satisfactory.

"You will note that the amount spent on building and grounds, is one of the largest expenditures this year.

Regarding the Rodeo: After careful consideration your 1928 directors decided to put on the rodeo, owing to the fact that the sum of approximately \$2000 had been spent by the previous board on fences, etc., for this kind of entertainment and thought it advisable to make use of that investment by putting the show on another year. This part of the program was a financial failure on account of weather conditions.

"In view of the uncertain weather conditions, I would like to suggest to incoming boards that they try to have the fair held a little earlier, possibly the latter part of August, and also endeavor to bring in features for entertaining inside the building.

We went into the question of getting here an aeroplane to perform stunts in the air, but owing to accidents occurring, we were unable to carry this out, and would like to suggest that something in the way of a parachute drop be entertained by future boards, as great development is taking place along these lines in the outside world today.

"Outside points were visited, namely Ketchikan and Smithers, with an endeavor to interest outside people to come here for the fair, but we were not successful. It appears to be a very difficult task, and it will be up to the new board to devise some way to get people from other points interested to come here during the fair, and make this the centre we expect it to be."
