Resolutions were passed at last night's meeting of the city council providing for the turning over to the Northern B. C. Power Co. instead of to the Power Corporation of Canada property at Cow Bay which is occupied by the old electric light system storehouse.

A petition was read at last night's meeting of the city council from H. Blake and three other persons asking for the installation of a street light at the corner of Dunsmuir Street and the lane to the rear of the Auditorium. The matter was referred to the utilities committee for report.

Questions from the Rupert East Ratepayers' Association with regard to the authority on which the roadway on McBride Street through McClymont Park was torn up, the cost of preparing the site for the rock crusher on Dunsmuir Street and the borrowing of money by the city from the bank were referred to the board of works and finance committee for report on being read at last night's council meeting.

A letter from Wright & Hinton, surveyors, read at last night's meeting of the city council, stated that it would cost between \$250 to \$300 to make surveys of the right-of-way of the power transmission line between the city and Shawatlans Lake. It will be necessary to have these surveys made before the transmission line can be turned over formally to the Northern B. C. Power Co. under the agreement between the Power Corporation of Canada and the city. The matter was referred to the board of works for report.

The report of a board of arbitration which sat last week to settle a dispute between the city and Albert & McCaffery over a consignment of sewer pipe was presented to the city council last night, the council endorsing the action of Mayor McMordie in having named City Engineer F. M. Good as the city's representative on the board. The mayor explained that the report of the board's findings had been given to the press for publication in advance of the council meeting since it was felt that the ratepayers were entitled to have that information.

Macdonald, chairman of the utilities committee, reported at last night's meeting of the city council that his committee had had a conference with the Power Corporation of Canada with regard to ornamental street lighting. A full report on the matter would be made later to the council after consideration had been given further information which was being awaited from the superintendent of the telephone department and the city engineer.

On recommendation of the utilities committee and the fire chief, the city council last night gave its approval to the new automatic fire alarm system which is being installed at the C.N.R. wharves in connection with which a wire will be run to the Fire Hall where an indicator will be placed showing where in the railway waterfront property fire may break out. It was pointed out that the system was similar to what were being installed in other cities. There would be no cost to the city.
