Tommy Loughran Knocked Out Last Night by Jack Sharkey in Third Round of Scheduled 15-Round Bout

Winner Put Big Punch Back Into Heavyweight Picture and Astonished Crowd of 45,000 People Who Watched Match

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Jack Sharkey, the Boston heavyweight contender, scored a technical knockout over Tommy Loughran in the third round of a scheduled fifteen round bout here last night. A single punch after 27 seconds fighting knocked Loughran down for the count of five, but he came up helpless, turned his back on his opponent and lost the fight as he gazed in a dazed fashion at the people in the arena. Sharkey had a distinct edge on the milling throughout.

Sharkey put the big punch back into the heavyweight picture, astonishing the crowd of 45,000 people. He showed the most convincing exhibition of speed and punching skill he has shown in more than two years. If ever a man was out on his feet, it was Tommy.

Too dazed to know what had happened, it was the first K.O. of Loughran's career and the first defeat in four years. Loughran was outboxed during the brief period of the battle.

Sharkey weighed 196, against Loughran's 186½. In a preliminary Tom Heeney of New Zealand defeated George Hoffman, a New York youngster, in a close, slow, milling 10-round bout.

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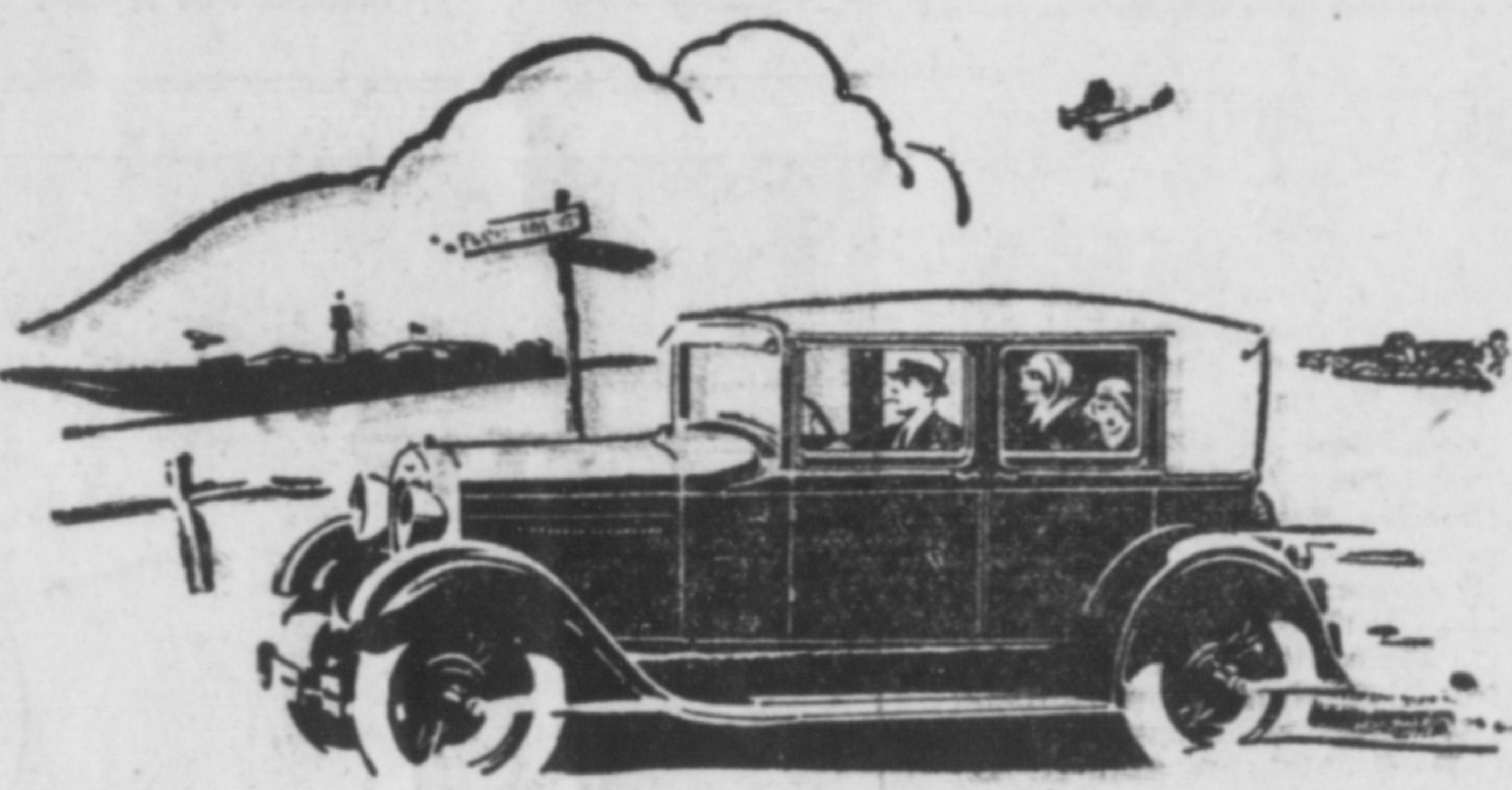

Oshawa's victories at New Westminster have served lacrosse well, and has brought home the fact that Canada's national game has not been forgotten by leading sportsmen, says a Toronto sports writer. At the festivities that have followed the homecoming of the Mann Cup holders have been noticed some of the most prominent men in Canada, all eager to pay tribute to a great team, and to the sport itself. This Oshawa team has done much to start lacrosse back to popularity, its rightful place in the country of its birth. Next year there may be a revival of interest.

Walter Vernon "Scotty" Martin, Indian athlete, was committed for trial on a charge of manslaughter by Magistrate John R. Lionel Conacher of the New York Americans, Duncan Munro of Montreal Maroons and Mark Shaughnessy of the Chicago Black Hawks are the new pilots, Conacher replacing Tommy Gorman and Shaughnessy taking over the reins of control held by Herb Gardiner, the veteran defense man whose services have been sold to the Boston Hockey Club. Art Ross will guide the Boston Bruins again, while Smythe of Toronto and Dave Gill, Ottawa, have been retained. Smythe, Conacher and Munro are natives of Toronto, while Hart and Ross hail from Montreal, Gill from Ottawa, Shaughnessy from Chicago, Adams from Fort William and Patrick from Vancouver.

him realized that it was illegal for him to give liquor to a minor. Mr. Patmore said he was prepared to produce the birth certificate showing accused was but 18 years old at the time of the accident.

The first witness at the morning session today was J. A. Rutherford B.C.L.S. of Smithers whose drawing of the scene of the accident was put in as an exhibit.

Sergeant W. J. Service, provincial police, also gave evidence. He told of being called to the scene of the accident and taking accused into custody. The road was dry and in good shape, Sergeant Service said. Where the accident occurred was a straight stretch probably 200 feet long and from 15 to 18 feet wide. The officer described tire marks which he said showed the car had gone about 42 feet on the extreme outer edge of the road and then for about 16 feet had gradually gone off. The foot brake was functioning properly but the emergency did not seem to be in good order. There were no signs of the car having skidded, Sergeant Service also told of finding the dead bodies.

At 1 o'clock court adjourned for luncheon and resumed at 2:15 this afternoon.

SAM TRETHEWAY DIED; ACCIDENT
