### TELLS ABOUT THE TALKIES

Speaker at Rotary Luncheon Explains Systems of Reproduction

That the system of talking pictures being installed here is the Western Electric, which is capable of handling either disc reproductions or the movietone, or other systems in which the sound is recorded on the picture, said J. G. Gerrard at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday. On the movietone the sound record takes up about one-eighth of an inch along the edge and represents light variations. The sound is projected to a photo-electric cell, amplified and sent around to the front of the theatre. The equipment being installed here includes methods of reproducing every system, so that none of the pictures may be excluded because of lack of facilities.

While the quality of the reproduction depends to some extent on the operator and instrument in the theatre, the chief variations result from the work of the producer, whatever the film brings being reproduced here.

Mr. Gerrard went into some detail in connection with the work and answered a number of questions, and at the close was thanked by President George Bryant for his address.

Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald, who is presiding at the session of the Supreme Court Assizes here this week, and W. E. G. Johnson, official stenographer, will leave on Monday for Prince George, where the Assizes will be held next week.
