

## Crowd of 93,000 People Watched Bolton Wanderers Win British Asso. Cup at Wembley Stadium

WEMBLEY STADIUM, April 27.—The Bolton Wanderers won the historic English Football Association Cup this afternoon from Portsmouth by two goals to nothing, in the presence of the Prince of Wales and a crowd estimated at 93,000. Much below expectations Bolton scored both tallies in the second half, Butler and Blackmoor, forwards, making the counts.

Bolton won the toss and decided to take advantage of the slight breeze blowing, but during the first half Portsmouth played a sterling game and before the period ended the Bolton backs were beginning to waver under persistent attacks.

After the crossover the great Bolton half and forward lines with their group of international stars who have been playing a waiting game, swung into action.

McClelland took a shot which would have gone in, but Gilfillan saved brilliantly. Gilfillan saved again brilliantly after a corner when Gibson put in a hot grounder. The Portsmouth side looked spent. Bolton richly deserved the first score.

In the 35th minute of the half Butler shot and Mackie on the goal line desperately attempted to kick the ball away. It hit the goal post and rebounded into the net. A minute later Butler looked like getting another but the ball went over the bar. Clever work by Butler and Gibson then enabled Blackmore to shoot into an empty net, Gilfillan having been lured out.

The final phase saw Portsmouth struggling fiercely but Bolton confidently checked their efforts. Chicago bombarded four Pittsburgh twirlers, Grantham securing a homer and Hornsby tripled in the third with three on bases. In the American League the New York Yankees lost out to Philadelphia, Quinn holding Ruth and his crowd to six scattered hits, while Mackmen found three Yankee pitchers for 11 safe blows. With the bases full the Yankees pulled off a triple play in the sixth.

## PROMINENT FIGURES IN SPORT

Michael H. Sexton, president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues for twenty-six years or more, has done much to place minor league baseball in its present strong position.

Interested in baseball more from the standpoint of a fan than a player, Sexton, who had made a success of the laundry and clothing business, became secretary and later president of the Rock Island baseball club and, with Beldon Hill of Cedar Rapids, organized the Illinois-Indiana-Iowa League which became known as the Three-I League. He became president of the league and in 1901, after the minor leagues had suffered con-

siderably because of the war between the National and American Leagues in connection with which star players jumped contracts to accept tempting offers made by the warring magnates, he was instrumental in organizing the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues to meet the situation.

Since its foundation, the National Association has included in its membership every minor league in the country. The National Association became a party to the proceedings in which peace was negotiated between the National and American Leagues. The peace pact provided adequate protection for the minor leagues that were members of the association.

## BRITISH GOLF TEAM REGAINS RYDER CUP IN PROFESSIONAL INTERNATIONAL GAMES PLAYED IN ENGLAND YESTERDAY AND TODAY

MOORETOWN, England, April 27.—The British professional golfers regained possession of the Ryder Cup today by smashing to a victory in the singles after the United States had established a bare lead in the foursome play yesterday. The British had a point score of 6 1/2, enough to win even if the United States had won the eighth match, which was unfinished.

United States entered eight singles matches today, leading two and one half to one and a half points.

Leo Diegel and Al Espinosa played the United States ahead by defeating Aubrey Boomer and George Duncan seven up and five to play in 36 holes.

Abe Mitchell and Fred Robson evened for England by defeating Gene Sarazen and Ed Dudley two up and one to play.

Charlie Whitcombe and Archie Compston finished all square with Johnny Farrell and Joe Turnessax.

Walter Hagen and John Golden put the United States ahead by defeating Ernest Whitcombe and Henry Cotton two up.
