INTERNATIONAL BASKETBALL

Ketchikan And Rupert Jets Opening Winners

Ketchikan scored an upset win last night at the Civic Centre when they outplayed the popular Metlakatla (Alaska) Vets by a 56 to 48 margin. The Vets took the first half by a 26-24 score. Both teams gave an excellent display of ball handling and shooting.

Big Jeff David, star centre man of the Metlakatla team, scored 13 points in the first half and racked up 22 before the game was over. He seemed to lose his drive in the final minutes of playing with both his shooting and passing going wild.

Brewer, for the winners, scored 18 and really sparked his team to a well earned victory. Erickson was also a tower of strength getting 15 points, 11 of them in the last half.

It was in the second half that Ketchikan really started to roll, as Brewer, Erickson and Christianson combined to score a total of 31 points, 11 of them by Christianson on a brilliant display.

The crowd was definitely for Metlakatla and was outspoken in criticism of the referees when a call was made against the favorites. However, referees Johnnie Comadina and Bill Davidson kept the game well under control and, when it was all over, there were no alibis from the losers.

In the first game of the tournament Rupert II, replacing Kitimat, put up a good show, although they were not able to outclass the Prince Rupert Jets who won by a 12-point 51-39 margin in a game which was well liked by the fans. During the first half the Jets were hard-pushed to head off the Rupert II entry by 18 to 15 points.

In the second half, Don Scherk and Joe Davis hit their strides, Scherk scoring 12 points and Davis 8 to make their totals 15 and 13 respectively for the game.

For the losers, Carlsson was always dangerous as he scored 11 points and every member of the team played his hardest. Considering that the boys were only contacted in mid-afternoon to turn out for the game and had never practised together.

Blackwood on Bridge

Here is one more situation where a bid of four no-trump does not ask for aces. When an opponent opening the bidding with a preemptive bid of four-odd an overcall of four no-trump has a special meaning. It asks partner to respond in his best suit just as he would respond to the take-out double of a one bid.

North-South vulnerable. West dealer. North (Mr. Masters) S-8 H-A J 10 7 D-A K Q 9 4 C-A K 8. East (Mr. Abel) S-10 7 3 H-K 9 5 4 2 D-10 5 C-9 4. The bidding: West 4S, North 4NT, East Pass, South 5C. Take today's hand for example. Not vulnerable against vulnerable opponents, Miss Brash figured that unless her partner had enough to give her some kind of play for four spades, then the opponents had a sure game and possibly a slam. If she got doubled and Mr. Abel had nothing at all she would probably lose just about as much as her opponents could make by buying the hand themselves. And by opening the hand with four spades, Mr. Masters and Mr. Champion might find it difficult to reach their best contract. Mr. Masters took some chance when he bid four no-trump forcing Mr. Champion to bid at the five range. But bridge is a game of taking chances and Mr. Masters is not one to run away from a reasonable risk. He knew it would likely Miss Brash would bid what he would have an opportunity to.

double her at five, six or even seven spades. Over the four no-trump bid Mr. Champion made the proper bid of five clubs and the everybody's surprise Miss Brash passed, as did Mr. Masters and Mr. Abel. Miss Brash won the first trick with the king of spades and shifted to the singleton eight of hearts. Mr. Champion suspected the singleton and made the good decision to refuse the heart finesse. He went up with the ace, took three rounds of trumps and led a diamond to dummy, discarding his last two hearts on the fourth and fifth diamonds. He kept a spade at the end but made his contract. The value of the vulnerable game was much more than the meagre 300 points Mr. Masters would have made by simply making spades.
