Napoleonic Curio To Museum

LONDON—An original cast of Emperor Napoleon's death mask is to be sold with a collection of antiques from Englemer, the Ascot home of Sir Archibald Weigall, former governor of South Australia. The mask was taken by Dr. Antommarchi, the Emperor's physician, who was minister in Florence at the time. In return the doctor gave the original cast to Lord Burghersh. Sir Archibald, giving up Englemer because of the high cost of its operation, expects to dispose of the mask as a museum exhibit. Made from some delicate composition, the mask has been kept on a padded base, under glass, since it came into the family's possession. Its value has never been disclosed.

Scouts Save Dog Frozen On Ice

MIDLAND, Ont.—Marooned on Midland harbor, with one paw frozen to the ice, a stray dog was recently rescued by three Boy Scouts. Using boards to support him, the lightest Scout inched his way out to the dog, freed it and brought it to shore. There the trio thawed it out, fed it and took it to a police station to await a claimant.

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"Sure Fire" Plan To Prop Economy

LONDON—Lord Bruce of Melbourne, chairman of the Finance Corporation for Industry, and former prime minister of Australia, has offered the British government what he termed "a sure-fire" plan to overcome the nation's economic crisis. He told members of the National Union of Manufacturers that the Socialists could have remedy for the asking. But urgent action would be necessary to meet a situation he believed was the most serious in peacetime history.

The answer, Lord Bruce said, was to frame a two-year emergency program involving among other measures drastic reduction in public expenditure, abandonment of further nationalization, increased industrial output and a curb on wage increases. Once drawn up, the program should be submitted for endorsement at a general election to be called without delay. Coupled with this proposal, Lord Bruce suggested an undertaking should be given by the political parties that at the close of the two-year emergency period there would be another appeal to the country.

One of the major planks in the proposed program calls for re-organization, re-equipment and modernization of industries already nationalized. Priority would be given to coal and transportation. At the same time, plans to bring iron and steel under state control, would be scrapped.

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
