

Aiding WHO's Fight Against Influenza

A close watch on the seasonal increase in influenza and on the possible danger of epidemics is being kept by the World Influenza Center in London, which the World Health Organization, a Specialized Agency of the United Nations, established in 1947. Above are shown laboratory experts at the Center inoculating a ferret with garglings received from Yugoslavia. After examination and typing of the virus, the information obtained will be sent to Yugoslavia and details of the world incidence of influenza will be made known.
