

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



Columbia Cellulose to Cut School Cost to Municipality

Due to the large industrial operations of Columbia Cellulose Company Limited in the district of Prince Rupert, there will be a greatly reduced school cost in coming years. At present, the city bears 78.82 per cent of school costs, or, for this year, \$150,495.10. The district, through taxes to the provincial government, pays 21.18 per cent.

This is based on the following assessments for school purposes -100 per cent of land value and 75 per cent on improvements: 1. For the municipality

\$6,700,000. 2. For the rural area - \$1,-800,000.

Because of the operations of Columbia Cellulose, the rural assessment is expected to be much greater in the future, thus reducing the obligation of school costs to the city.
