in the person of Frank Wilson.

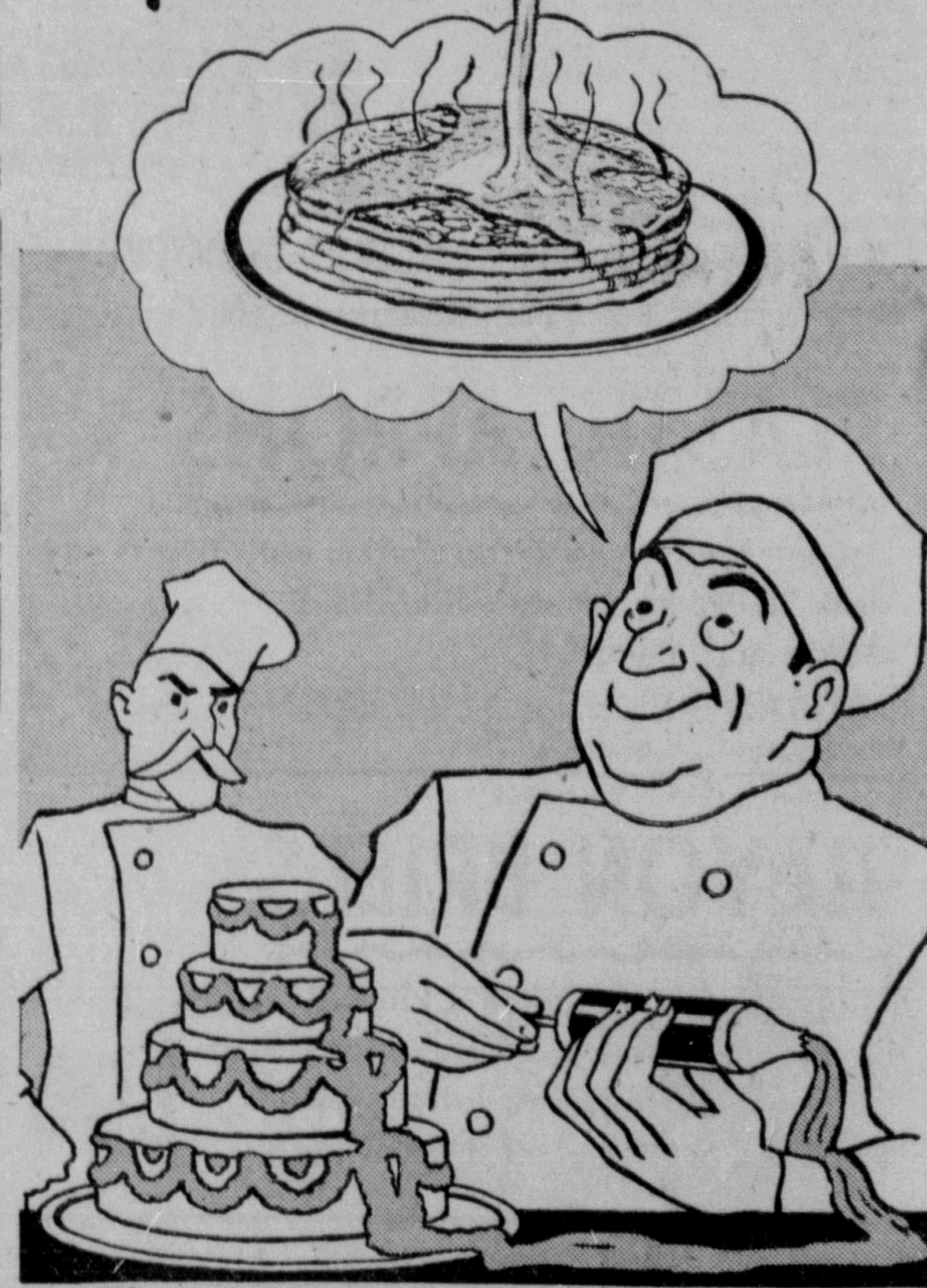
J. S. Wilson, northern B.C.
