



Ontario Has Its Hospital Problem Too

TORONTO ()-By the middle of 1952, Ontario will have increased its net hospital accommodations by 9,000 beds since the end of the second world war.

That will leave the province with 5.67 beds for every 1,000 residents-well below the generally-accepted standards of seven to 1,000, but a considerable improvement over the cramped conditions of a few years ago

Nearly \$100,000,000 is earmarked for the expansion pro- 551 gram, which began in 1947. A large portion has come from Ontario government grants, matched by equal grants from the federal government.

The full program provides for construction of 29 new hospitals and major additions to 71 others Most of these projects have been completed and are in operation. Despite the building program, Ontario still has hospital prob-




