It was reported that Abdullah, 69 years of age, was shot as he was entering a mosque at Amman for prayers. His second son, Prince Waif, has been appointed

The assassin was identified as Mustapha Shakir, a notorious terrorist, who was friendly with the Grand Mufti. Shakir, himself, was shot dead by the royal odyguard after the shooting. Martial law was declared after the shooting.

The killing of Abdullah promises new difficulties in the Midle East for Britain, already carried by the oil crisis.

The British put Abdullah on the throne after the Second World War and supplied funds for his government and the strong Arab Legion.




