

Dominion Day

IT'S CANADA'S 84th birthday Sunday and religious observances will precede the celebrations on Monday, officially designated as a public holiday.

Since Confederation in 1867 Canada has progressed to nationhood, one of the world's "middle" powers in her own right. From the combined Upper and Lower Canada with its population of 3,689,000 in the first census of 1871, Canada now has 10 provinces with a population of about 14,000,000. She has sent forces overseas in two world wars and right now has a brigade of 21,000 soldiers, plus navy destroyers, engaged in the Korean campaign.

Prime Minister St. Laurent told Parliament a few days ago that he believes the Yukon and the Northwest Territories will achieve provincial status in some future year. He was moving amendments to the Federal District Commission Act providing for representation on that board of Canada's newest province, Newfoundland, which entered Confederation on March 31, 1949.

In many capitais abroad tribute will be paid to Canada's nationhood. Here Canadians pay tribute to the "Fathers of Confederation" who conceived the idea of the Empire's first self-governing member, and brought their dream to reality in a series of historic conferences at Quebec, Charlottetown and finally in London.

It was at the last conference that Canada's title of "Dominion" was chosen. Delegates found their text in the Biblical quotation: "He shall have dominion from sea to sea." But the first confederation joined only Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario and Quebec.

Manitoba entered in 1870. British Columbia followed in 1871, and Prince Edward Island in 1873. All the rest of British North America was annexed as territories in 1880, and from these areas Alberta and Saskatchewan were formed in 1905. Newfoundland was the 10th.

It's a greater Canada than ever the Fathers of Confederation dreamed of, and it's still growing.

NOTICE OF RESTRICTED INDUSTRIAL CLOSURE UNDER SECTION 120, SUB-SECTION 1, OF THE "FOREST ACT"

In view of the hazardous condition of the forests, and pursuant to the provisions of section 120 of the "Forest Act" the area herein described below is hereby declared to be a closed district as from midnight Friday, June 29th, 1951, until such time as a subsequent order has declared the danger abated and the closed district abolished. DESCRIPTION OF CLOSED DISTRICT

All that part of the Prince Rupert forest district which ies to the west of Terrace and the summit of the Cascade Mountains (which includes the Queen Charlotte Islands). During the continuance of this closure it is hereby ordered

A. No person shall conduct any logging, land clearing, mining, road building right-of-way clearing or construction projects within one-half mile of any forest or woodland between the hours of one p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time and 7:00 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time within the closed district unless otherwise authorized by the district

B. No person shall operate any sawmill or open burner, or burn, or permit to burn, any wood, sawdust, or debris within one-half mile of forest, woodland, logging slash or forest debris from 1:00 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time until 7:00 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time daily within the closed district and all such sawmilling and industrial operations operating open burners or othewise burning, or permitting to burn, any sawdust or debris within onehalf mile of any forest, woodland, logging siash or forest debris, shall maintain watchman therefore twenty-four hours daily, during the period of this order, unless exemption is granted under written permit from the district forester.

C. No person shall operate any railway that is not a common carrier from 1:00 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time until 7:00 p.m. Pacific Daylight Saving Time, daily within closed district without first obtaining a written permit from the district forester.



The central truth is that all across a broad belt of the earth -we might call it the Muslim belt, or brown-skinned section of the human family—a truly revolutionary situation is swiftly coming to a head.

The people are "desperately poor and horribly ignorant." But they are not so poor or so ignorant as not to understand one of the great facts of life of 1951 -that they are much worse off than are the people of Europe and America, whose governments have a special position of power in the Middle East.

WHEREVER DESPERATELY poor people are under any kind of foreign control, they are bound to blame ALL their local problems on that foreign con-

That is partly because no man can be so poor or ignorant as not to understand the meaning of having foreign troops in his country to protect some foreign interest-not the local country's. So long as foreign troops are there, he knows perfectly well that his country is not a fully free country. There may be times when few, if any, of the people of such countries resent the presence of foreign troops, or foreign business corporations, which have special privileges over and above those enjoyed by native concerns. We see one example of that in Saudi Arabia.

But when times are bad and class discontent is wide and deep, the foreign army or foreign institution becomes the inevitable target for all the resentments of all the people. It gets blamed for all evils-not only for its own real sins.

THE MOST DANGEROUS feature of the whole situation in that part of the world which runs from Iran, Iraq, to all North Africa is that the poor people have no effective political machinery through which to

Even where they have nominal democracy, as in Iran and Egypt, the real power is in the hands of a corrupt, wealthy class, who have not the slightest intention of allowing, much less helping, the people to come to grips with their real prob-lems. It is these mean, wealthy people and their stooges in parliaments, who become the most dangerous of all elements at a time like the present in Iran. fire which may blaze over vast fire which may braze over vast sections of the earth.

For, to detract attention from their own social and economic exploitation, they whip up the mass of the people against "the foreign exploiter."
