MONTREAL (P)—Armand Savoie of Montreal Monday night won a second round technical knock-out over Pierre Montane when the European lightweight champion failed to come out for the bell at the second round.

The bout was stopped seconds before the bell ending the first round after Savoie opened a gash over Montane's right eye.

Referee Tomy Sullivan halted the fight but the victory was not officially awarded to Savoie until a Montreal Athletic Commission doctor said Montane could not answer the bell for the second round.

Savoie weighed in at 136 pounds and Montane at 136½ pounds.

FINE SHOW—

Effective Demonstration Of Civic Centre Activity

Mass Display Shows What Has Been Going On at Popular Community Venue

Prince Rupert's Civic Centre is doing a "marvelous job" in the way of healthy community recreation. Jerry Mathison, provincial supervisor of the men's division of the department of recreation and physical recreation, said so last night as he opened the fourth annual gymnastic display of Prince Rupert-Rup-Rec.

The demonstration of all types of Civic Centre activity—a review of what has been going on there during the past winter—amply corroborated Mr. Mathison's statement. It was a revelation indeed to the big audience which crowded the main gymnasium of the Civic Centre to witness the show.

No less than 275 persons took part in what was probably the most colorful and impressive presentation of its kind that has yet taken place at Civic Centre. They ranged from the Tiny Tots, who opened the two-hour program with their singing games which captivated the audience—through the junior and intermediate acrobatic classes to such innovations as boxing, badminton and square dancing, demonstrating other lines of activity at Prince Rupert's centre of cultural and recreational en-



LCS ANGELES—The old proposal to bring major league baseball to Los Angeles got a boost—second hand from Bill Veeck, former boss of the Cleveland Indians.

County Supervisor Leonard J. Roach said he conferred recently with Veeck here and quoted the latter as "jumping up and down with enthusiasm."

"He told me he could swing it," Roach added.

Roach said Veeck brought along two Chicago architects who determined that the 105,000-seat Memorial Coliseum could be used for baseball, with its seating capacity increased to 125,000 for such an attraction as the World Series.

Jackie Robinson is off to a great start in the batter's box with the Dodgers and, like all hitters with inflated averages he is having to hit the dirt occasionally to escape being nicked by the inside pitch. In a recent game between the Dodgers and the Giants, Sal Maglie "knocked" Robinson down and Jackie employed the traditional comeback of the annoyed hitter. He bunted down the first base line, making Maglie cover the bag, then ran into him.

Immediately in such brushes, fans and critics begin thinking of the Negro versus white. But Robinson's race has nothing whatever to do with it and should not be emphasized. Jackie simply is one of the game's better hitters, an enemy of all National League pitchers who are called upon to work against the Brooklyn club.

Remember the trouble Lou Boudreau had with rival pitchers in 1948, when he was having his greatest year? They were always knocking him down and it was hard for Lou to take. But he took it. So can Robinson.

The better hitters should expect to be brushed back from the plate and most of them do. Meanwhile, Robinson will continue to spark the Dodgers' attack, getting up out of the batter's box to challenge Stan Musial and anybody else aiming at the 1951 batting crown.
