## MR. PATTULLO ARRIVED TODAY

Premier Oliver Prevented From Coming Owing to Automobile Breaking Down.

On the delayed train arriving here this morning was Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and member for this district. He made a trip up the P. G. E. along with Premier Oliver on a trip of inspection. The plan was for the party to have come on to this city but owing to a breakdown of an automobile it was found impossible to make the round trip and get home in time to meet engagements. The Premier therefore returned by the P. G. E. and Mr. Pattullo came on alone.

Mr. Pattullo said he had received word that the Minister of Finance and the Minister of Education, Hon. John Hart and Hon. Dr. McLean, were leaving Vancouver today and would arrive here on the boat Wednesday. Then there will be three ministers of the crown in the city at the same time.
