R. G. Moore—Why doesn't the Civic Centre bring such artists as James Melton, Lauritz Melchior or John Charles Thomas?

Don Forward—The main reason is that the fees of such artists would be in the \$2000 to \$3000 dollar range which would mean that we would have to fill every seat at \$5 a seat to make expenses. On the other hand the Alaska Music Trail costs us \$1200 for seven artists who give three concerts. The artists get very little if anything out of it for the money all goes into a pool. At the end of the season, after all expenses have been paid, if there is anything left in the pool it is divided among the artists, no booking agent getting a 10 to 50 percent cut as is the custom with any other concert series.

Kemano Man to Hospital Here

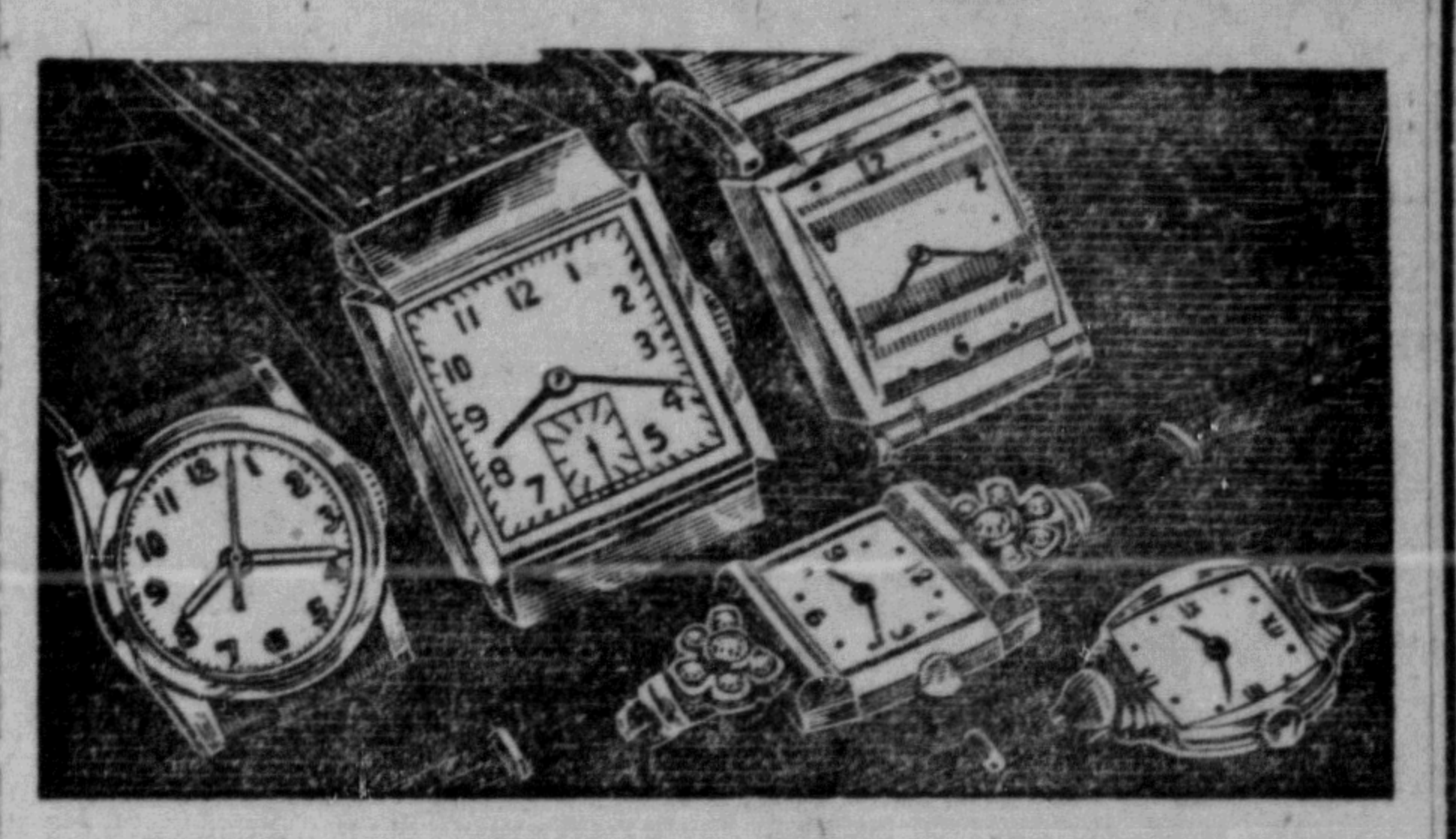
