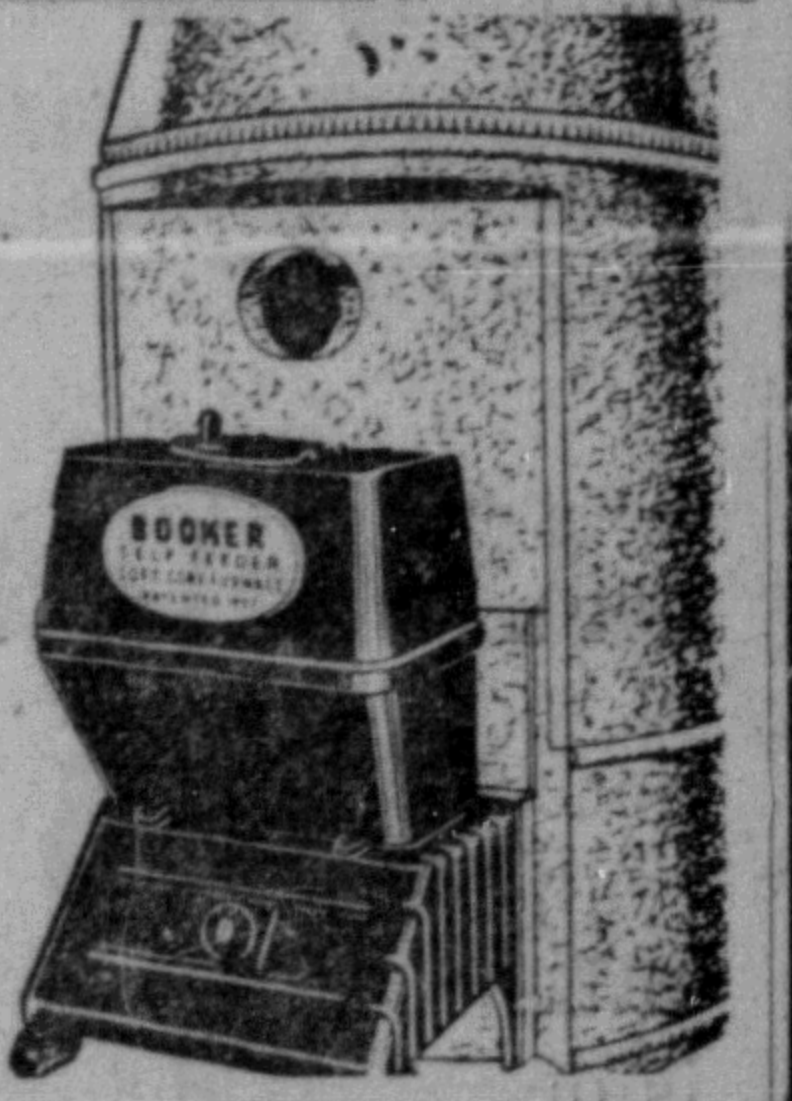

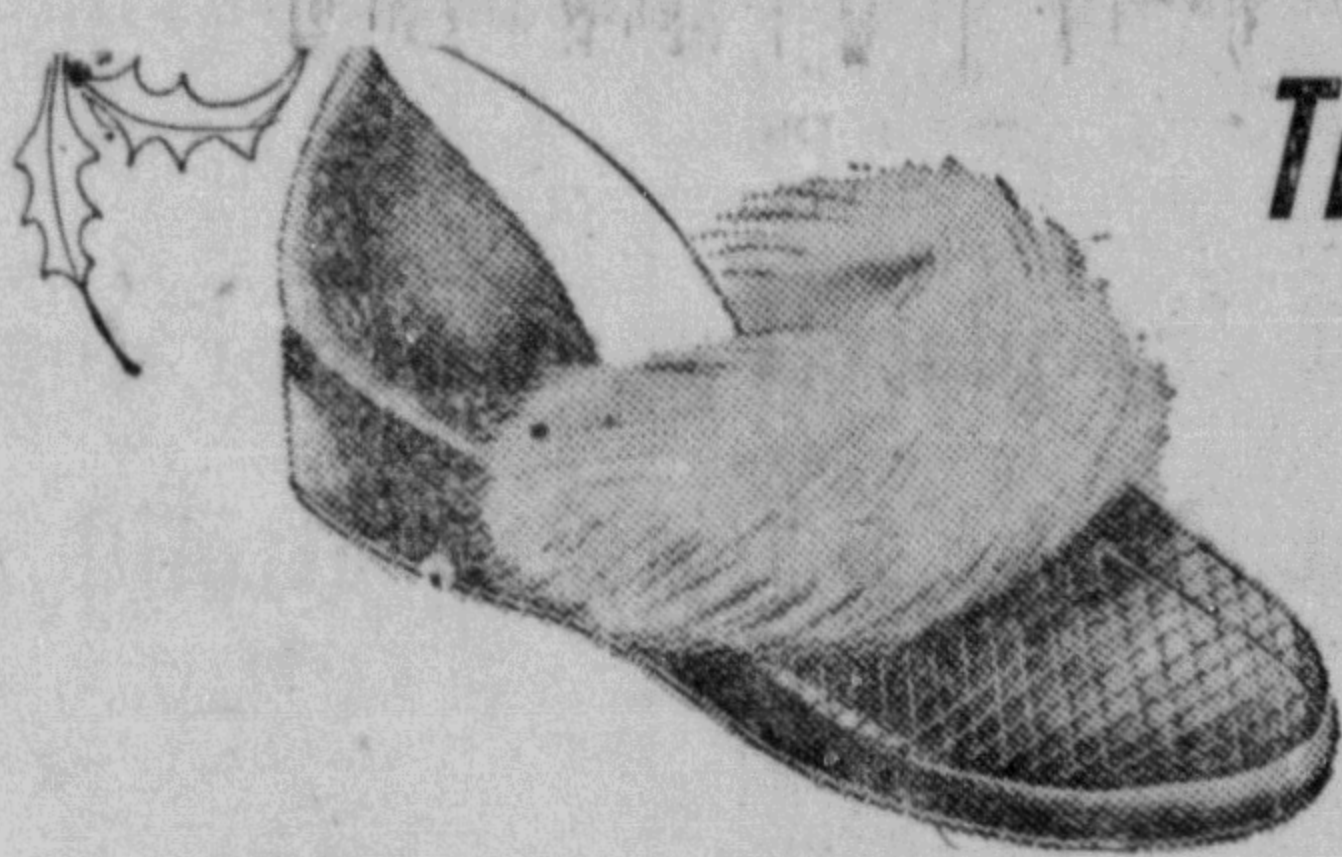

Announcement of the acceptance of this budding Prince Rupert vocalist was made last night by C. E. Findlater of Vancouver, veteran director of the choir following audition yesterday afternoon and consent of her parents.

She was proposed by Barbara Haugan, who was a member of the choir and made the trip to Vancouver during the past summer. She will go into intensive training immediately at the home of Henry Flaym, director of the choir at Both Memorial High School, and will travel to Vancouver at Christmas and Easter for periods of rehearsal with the choir prior to the overseas tour.

Shirley has been a member of the junior choir of First Presbyterian Church which is directed by Mrs. E. J. Smith.

Mr. Findlater was impressed with the candidate at yesterday's audition and was enthusiastic about the qualities which led to her acceptance.

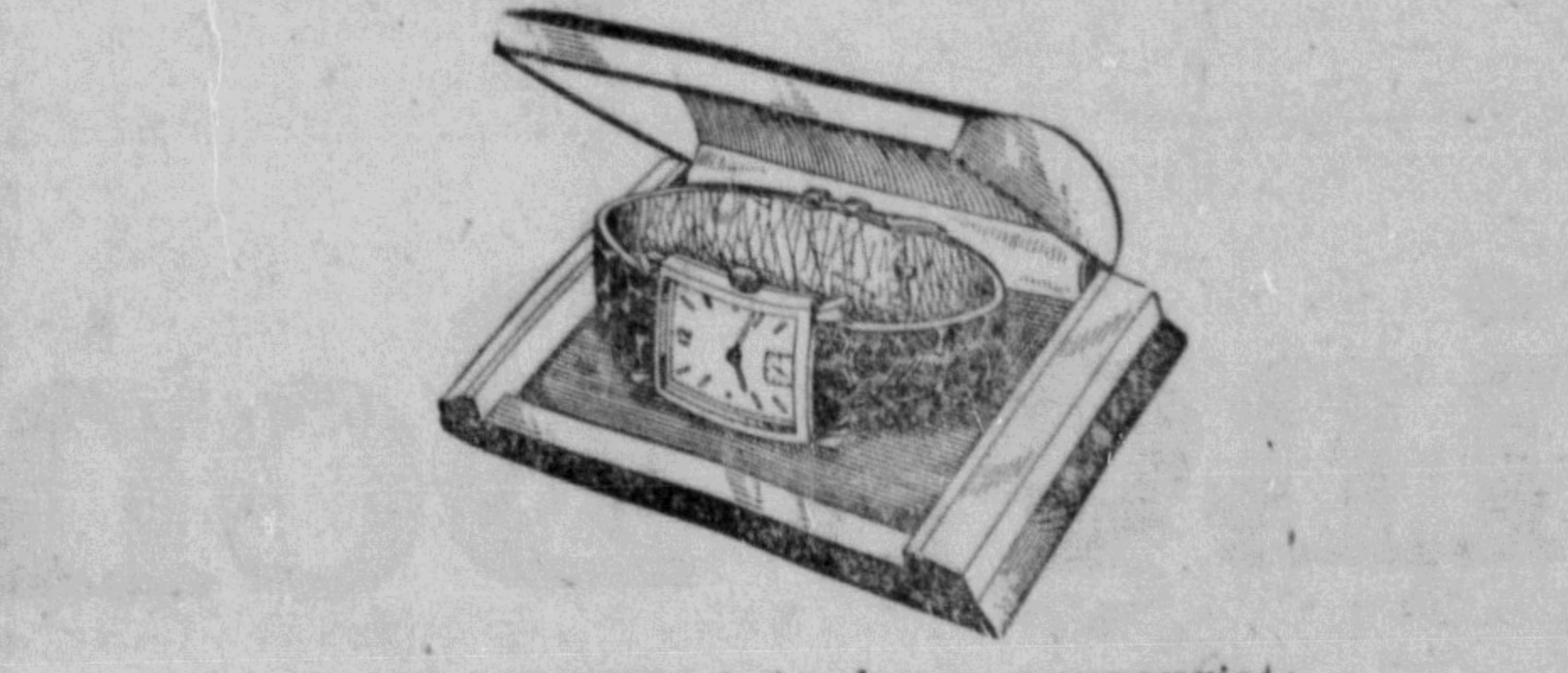
