## VD Rising In States

NEW YORK (AP)-In spite of the new quick cures, venereal disease is rising again in the United States.

One reason is war preparations. Another is cuts in federal money for fighting syphilis and gonorrhea. Whether the rapid cures assist by increasing temptation is not clear.

The rise is a recent reversal of the downward trend since the second world war.

wuick cures have taken away the immunity to syphilis which many persons got under the old treatments. The immunity dia not come from the medicine, but from the long time a person had the disease, a year or more while taking the care. CURED BUT BACK


