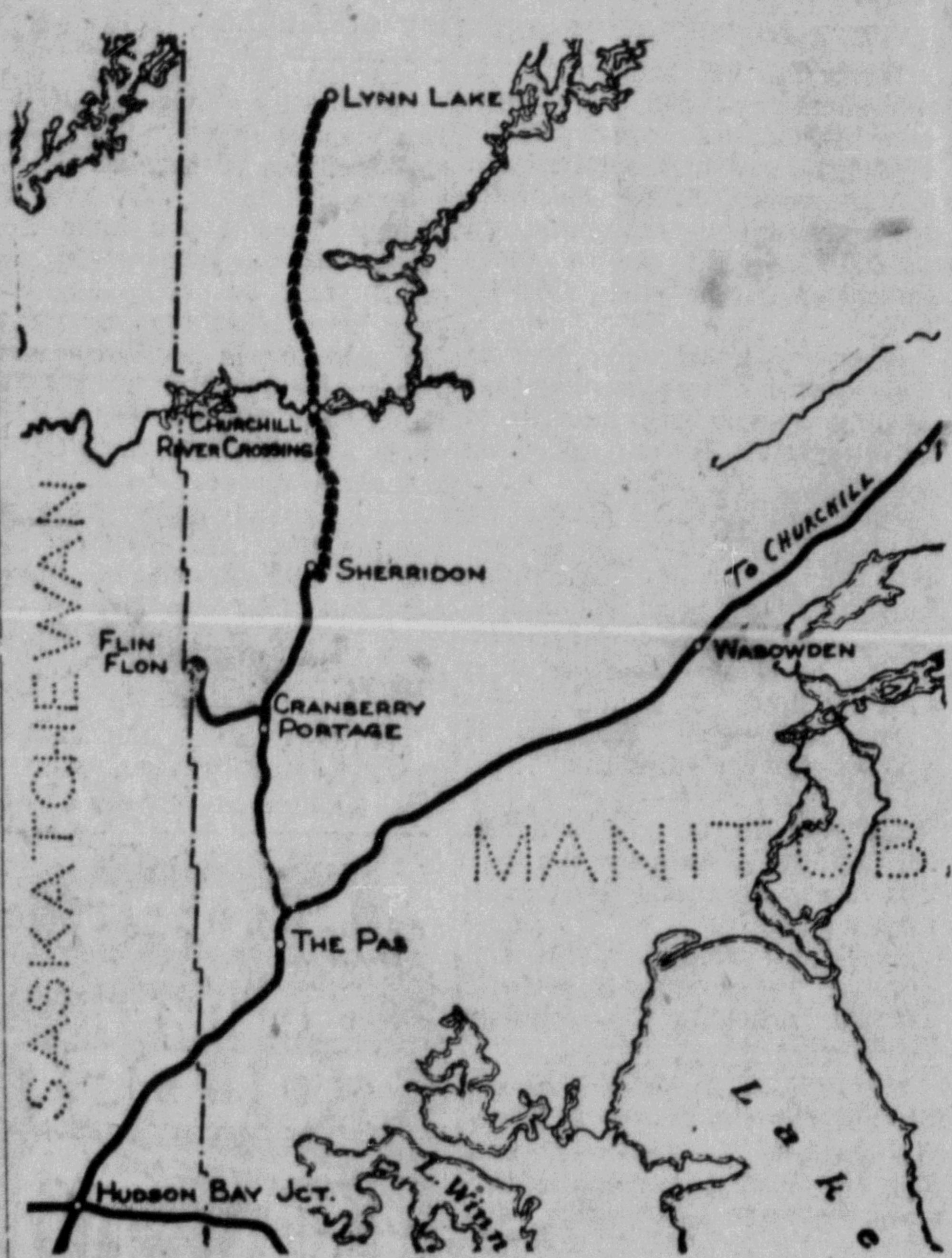

Industry In City Planned

EDMONTON, Ont. — M. W. Maxwell, chief of development, Canadian National Railways, in an address Monday before the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities at their annual convention here, outlined the municipality's role in industrial development and criticized certain aspects of city planning.

Iran Takes Over Oil Co. Nationalization Is Effective

TEHRAN, Iran (CP)—Iran symbolically hoisted her red-white-and-green national flag over the central office building of the British-owned Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. near Abadan today.

An impromptu ceremony, in effect proclaiming that Iran considers she has taken over the billion dollar company, went off peacefully. It occurred at just about the time two Anglo-Iranian directors and four other officials arrived in Tehran from London to begin negotiations on the future of the company.

Columbia Cellulose Homes Would be "Close to Mill"

If Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd. build homes for their employees, the houses will be built "closer to the mill" than in Prince Rupert. In a letter to city council, Dr. R. H. Ball, mill co-ordinator, said the company did not want to build houses.

Dr. Ball also pointed out that the housing shortage in Prince Rupert was not due only to the coming of Columbia Cellulose. The need for housing in Prince Rupert, he said, "far exceeds" the needs of the pulp mill employees. But if the company did build homes, they would be near the mill.

Further Expansion is Foreseen by President Of Columbia Cellulose

Market Greater Than Supply Today—Minister Sees Added Responsibilities

Harold Blancke, president of Columbia Cellulose Company Ltd., told more than 400 prominent people at the official opening of the new \$27,000,000 pulp plant today that the company's new dissolving pulp mill is to be substantially expanded and that "it is quite possible that the company will have to build additional plants before an equilibrium can be attained between demand and supply."

Mr. Blancke said that world markets for the mill's products are already larger than the company can supply with present facilities. He also said that, while initial production will be exported, in the near future part of the mill's output will be consumed in Canada in chemical fibre plants engaged in producing filament yarns and staple fibre for the growing textile industry in Canada.

Government officials, business and industrial leaders from all parts of Canada and the United States, and Prince Rupert community leaders, attended the ceremonies today which began just before noon when Hon. E. T. Kenney, British Columbia Minister of Lands and Forests, raised a four-yard Canadian Red Ensign made entirely of acetate yarn. The only flag of its kind in Canada, it was manufactured here of specially dyed washable taffeta.

Following the flag raising, the guests were served luncheon in the mill's huge warehouse, and taken on a two-hour tour of the mill, the most modern of its kind (Continued on page 5)

Break With Russia

WASHINGTON (CP) — Lieut.-Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer today called for a withdrawal of American troops from Korea "now," and a break in diplomatic relations with Russia at the same time.

In his testimony before the Senate's MacArthur inquiry committee, the former United States wartime commander in China said: "I would go into full mobilization, and I would go further. I would go to the real perpetrator of all this, because it is not the Koreans—the crux of this thing is in the Kremlin."

When Wedemeyer proposed breaking relations with Russia—and the Soviet satellites as well—he was asked if that wouldn't amount to a declaration of war.

He replied: "Not necessarily. It is a calculated risk you would just take."

Wedemeyer, now Sixth Army commander in San Francisco, said he meant to make it clear that any withdrawal of forces from Korea "should be done under the aegis of the United Nations."

Prominent Personages Are Warmly Welcomed

Peace Bid Considered

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CP)—United Nations governments, fighting in Korea once more are considering a public peace bid to the Communists, it is learned. While no decision has been made, it seems probable that a statement on general terms for peace will be issued if there is reason to believe that such action would enlarge chances for a Korean settlement.

It would probably be along lines proposed in the peace statement that the United Nations governments gave help to President Truman last March. They shelved the statement when Gen. Douglas MacArthur issued the first of his own truce bids coupled with the hint that the war would be carried to China unless it yielded promptly.

Reds are Fleeing

TOKYO (CP)—Three long columns of Communists fled through East Korea's mountains today to escape being trapped by allied tanks rumbling through their fallen "iron triangle."

Stout new defence lines protected the Reds from the east-central front. United Nations troops mopped up Reds in the hills around captured Chormon and Kumhwa. The towns formed the southern anchors of the Pyongyang valley "iron triangle" build-up area.

While the Reds were pulling back from the fighting fronts, unverified reports cropped up they are building new forces only 30 miles northwest of Seoul. The build-up was reported in the Kaesong-Korango area. This is near the forefront of the allied western flank.

Lamarr Weds Fourth Time

LOS ANGELES, California — Hedy Lamarr, 35, and Ernest (Ted) Stauffer, 42, night-club operator, were married late last night at the home of Judge Stanley Mosk, who performed the ceremony. It was the fourth marriage for the Austrian-born actress, and the second for Stauffer, one-time bandleader.

Murder Conviction Appeal is Deferred

Harold Ryan Granted Reprieve—Complaint That Jury Attended Theatre, Mingled With Public

VANCOUVER (CP)—Appeal of Harold Ryan from a conviction for murder December 23, 1950, near Port Simpson of Lorraine Tait was transferred by the Court of Appeal yesterday to its next sitting at Victoria in September.

Ryan was sentenced by Mr. Justice MacFarlane to be hanged July 24 and has since been granted a reprieve to October 5. Reason for the delay was that transcript of the trial evidence has not yet been completed. The notice of appeal claims that the jury, housed in the Civic Centre building at Prince Rupert, was permitted on the evening of May 3 to attend a movie theatre where jurors "mingled with the public."

Anti-Reds Gain Hold

ROME (CP) — Premier Alcide De Gasperi's Christian democrats and allied pro-Atlantic Pact parties today had stripped Communists of their administrative control in three major Italian cities. They had won in seven others on basis of latest returns from a round of Italian local elections.

Iran "Cordial" With British

TEHRAN — Premier Mohammed Mossadegh told President Truman today that Iran is anxious "to protect cordial relations with the British government." This statement was contained in the premier's reply to President Truman's personal message of June 1.

Rate Change Voted Down

OTTAWA — Commons voted 136 to 30 today against a Progressive Conservative motion calling for reconsideration of proposed increases in postal rates on newspapers.

Nehru Thankful For Wheat Loan

NEW DELHI (CP)—Prime Minister Nehru declared today that a "generous gesture" of the American people in loaning India 2,000,000 tons of wheat "will evoke friendly responses in India and will bring two peoples nearer one another."
