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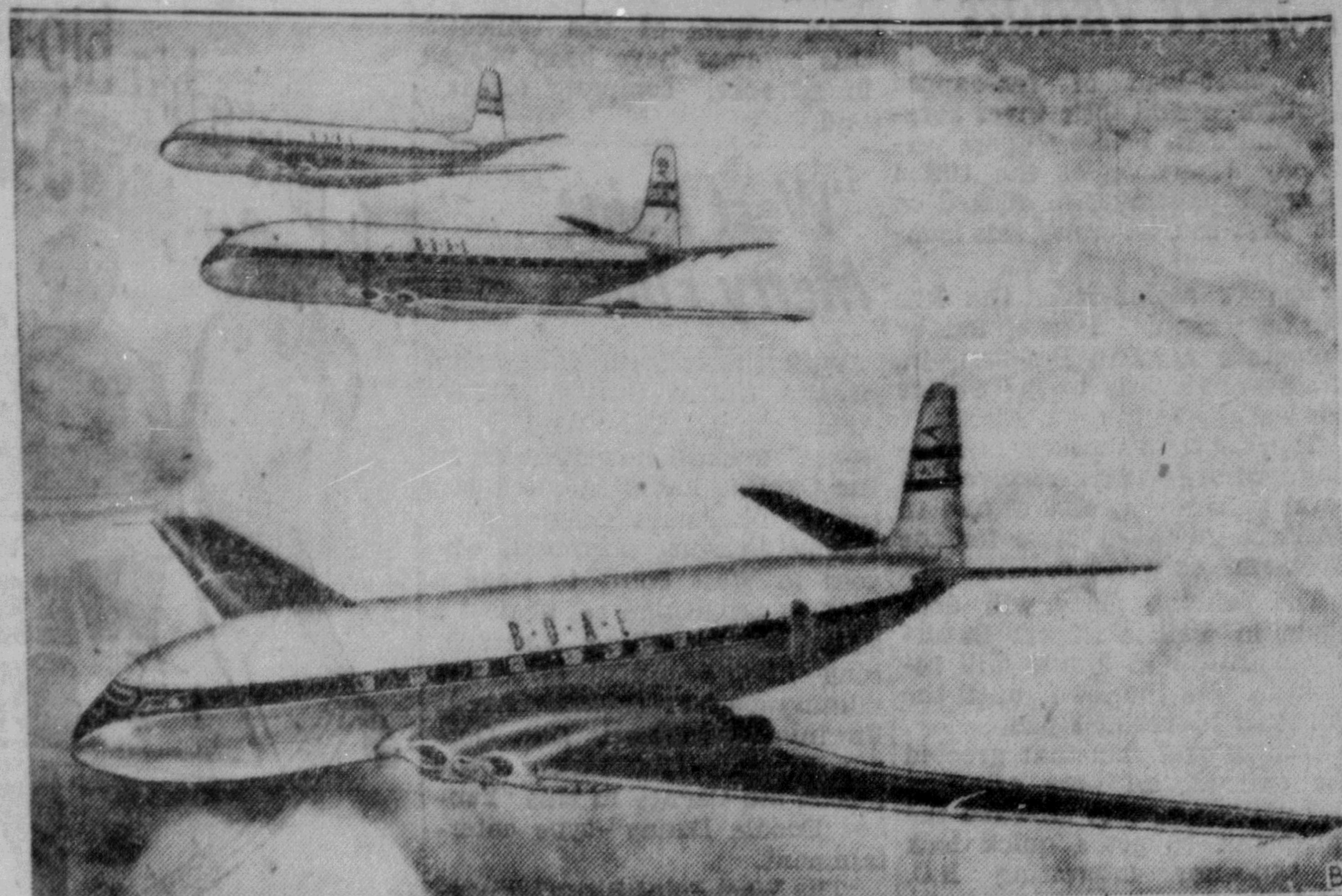

city, organized by the Chamber of Commerce, under direction of Hugo Krauppner.

Harold Blanche, president of Columbia Cellulose Co., was the first to step ashore, and when he was greeted by Mayor G. W. Rudderham amid a tumultuous applause and the rousing strains of the band, he said:

"I'm quite amazed. I had no idea we were so important."

in the world today.

Mr. Blanche stressed the importance of good relations between the company and its employees. In this connection he said that Columbia Cellulose has already done considerable planning toward a sound program of group insurance.

Lauding the British Columbia government for its far-seeing forestry legislation, Mr. Blanche said, "the policies of conservation laid down by the present generation of British Columbia officials arouse enthusiasm everywhere among men of goodwill. Here in the northwestern section of our continent are greater natural resources than any yet developed. They could be systematically developed into a base for an industrial economy that can endure until the end of time. It is fortunate for British Columbia and for Canada that the government has enacted into law this latter far-sighted program. The province's natural heritage will now become the permanent foundation for industrialization in the best interests of the people."

Referring specifically to the legislation providing for the Forest Management Licence, of which Columbia Cellulose holds the first ever granted, Mr. Blanche said: "When we speak of the conservation of forests we mean not only the protection but the efficient use of forests, harvested as a crop and grown to yield a maximum return."

"Columbia Cellulose is aware of its responsibilities as the first company to be licensed under this policy. It is, in effect, a partnership with the people through their government."

**HON. E. T. KENNEY**

Speaking on behalf of the provincial government, Hon. E. T. Kenney described the widespread effect of this new industry on northern British Columbia. "Not only Prince Rupert will benefit from it," he said, "but also all the surrounding communities."

"We are bursting our industrial seams and it is bringing attendant problems," Mr. Kenney said "but they are welcome problems and healthy signs. Pride in growth releases the best energies that are within us and it will be a sought-after challenge to solve the difficulties of agriculture, land settlement, transportation and small-business establishment, all of which and many more are pertinent in coping with large scale expansion."

Mr. Kenney paid particular tribute to the older residents of Prince Rupert who have had many disappointments since the original land boom in 1909, and who are now experiencing a new and lasting prosperity. "The reward for faith is finally being paid in generous amount," he said.

He also pointed out that there will be a growing interdependence between northern British Columbia and northern Alberta through the establishment of the projected Canadian Chemicals Company plant at Edmonton. When the project is completed, pulp from the Prince Rupert mill will go directly to Edmonton for processing into cellulose acetate.

**GREETINGS OF INDUSTRY**

Paul Cooper, chairman, western division, Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, and President of Pacific Mills, extended the industry's official greetings.

"Prince Rupert's fine new accent... but for Columbia Cellulose Company is a Class A example of risk capital at work establishing a giant operation to convert, at a profit, the continuous crops of trees from managed forests into products for the world markets. To Canada's growing and essential export sales, Columbia Cellulose will annually make an important contribution of hard dollars," Mr. Cooper said.

Mayor George Rudderham welcomed the mill on behalf of Prince Rupert.

do about the \$10 a month cost of living bonus to old-age pensioners, when the pension becomes universal next year. Everybody, irrespective of income is going to get \$40 a month from the Federal government; those already on pension in B.C. will continue to receive \$50 a month.

But the big number of people who will turn 70 next January and automatically go on pension would almost break the B.C. government if they all got the \$10 a month cost of living bonus.

The government believes it will have to have a means test of its own for those over 70 before the cost-of-living bonus will be given. The government hates the idea of a means test—but it seems the only fair way.

Then, there's worry about the 65-70 age group. These people, under a means test, will be entitled to a pension—and again the question comes up: will they also be entitled to a \$10 a month cost of living bonus?

These are serious questions and the cabinet is discussing them at length.
