## Big Steamship Arrives to Load Lumber at Local Dock

War Company was Piloted North by well Known Coast Skipper; Vancouver Built Vessel Handles like a Yacht says Her Captain.

This morning the big steamship War Company, 3,800 tons, steamed into port and docked at the coal wharf shortly after ten o'clock. Captain MacBeath is in charge and is very well known along the coast in navigation circles. The pilot on the trip north was Capt. Cecil Wearmouth, a brother of Bert Wearmouth of this city, who now holds a position on the Pilot Board in Vancouver. Many of his old time friends will be glad to hear of his arrival here. Charles Williams, surveyor for the Imperial Munitions Board, is also making the trip and Charles Coughlan of the firm of Coughlan & Sons, the builders of the ship. Mr. Rhodes, the engineer of Coughlan & Sons, has also made the trip north and is representing the company on board and is watching the progress of the ship.

Captain MacBeath reports a very excellent voyage here with an average speed of 10 1-2 knots. The total steaming time was about 45 hours, but they were held up for 15 hours on account of fog. "The ship handles beautifully, just like a yacht," is the skipper's comment. In the engine room with Chief Engineer Thomas Cowan in charge everything has gone fine.

The "War Company" was built by J. Coughlan & Sons of Vancouver and was launched August 24, 1919. This is really her maiden voyage and she will receive her first full cargo at this port. She will load the spruce still left at the coal dock by the Imperial Munitions Board. She brought up a small quantity of freight to Cheakamus on the way here.

### Dimensions.

The dimensions of the War Company are: Length over all, 427 ft.; length B. P., 410 ft. 5 1-2 ins.; breadth moulded, 54 ft.; depth of hold to top of floors, 27 ft. 5 ins.; depth moulded, 29 ft. Her hold capacity is: Grain, 479,652 cubic feet; half beam, 450, 944 1-2 cubic feet; bale, 438,854.

The Government Fisheries cruiser Stadacona arrived this morning bringing Lieut.-Governor Sir Frank Stillman Barnard, and A. T. Goward, Victoria manager of the B. C. Electric Railway Co. The Governor spent a few hours in the city making an official call on Mayor McClymont at his office and on Government Agent J. H. McMullin and Judge Young. He was also shown the drydock, the cold storage and the mill by Hon. T. D. Pattullo, who took advantage of the occasion.

The party has been on a fishing trip on the steamer which is still operated under the naval department. She should have been here Monday but was delayed by fog.

The Stadacona recently arrived on the coast from Halifax and this is her first trip since her arrival. She is commanded by Captain Thomas who took H. M. C. S. Shearwater to Halifax some time ago.

From here he goes to Alice Arm and will then hurry back to Victoria.

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## Crown Prosecution of Business Agent Electrical Workers

Boston Police Force on Strike; John Mitchell Underwent Operation; Mine Workers to Deal with Unruly Unions that went On Strike.

Toronto, Sept. 10.—The crown authorities are preparing to prosecute James T. Dunn, business agent of the Electrical Workers Union, on the ground that he is responsible for the strike of the electrical workers and the consequent stoppage of the street railway service for four hours while the exhibition was on. Great inconvenience was caused to the public by the traffic hold up.

Boston, Sept. 10.—Union members of the Boston police force are on strike. Window smashing was done about midnight and considerable property was stolen from the small stores. Police inspectors and Metropolitan Park patrolmen succeeded in scattering the crowd after firing a few shots in the air.

New York, Sept. 10.—John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers of America, and one of the most widely known labor leaders in the United States, underwent an operation ten days ago. He is 49 years of age.

Cleveland, Ohio., Sept. 10.—The United Mine Workers in convention here may exclude from their meetings delegates from the local unions that have gone on unauthorized strikes.

Glasgow, Sept. 10.—By a vote of 4,478,000 to 77,000 the Trade Union Congress today passed a resolution favoring the nationalization of coal mines.

## VATICAN JOINS IN DEMOCRATIC MOVE OF WORLD
