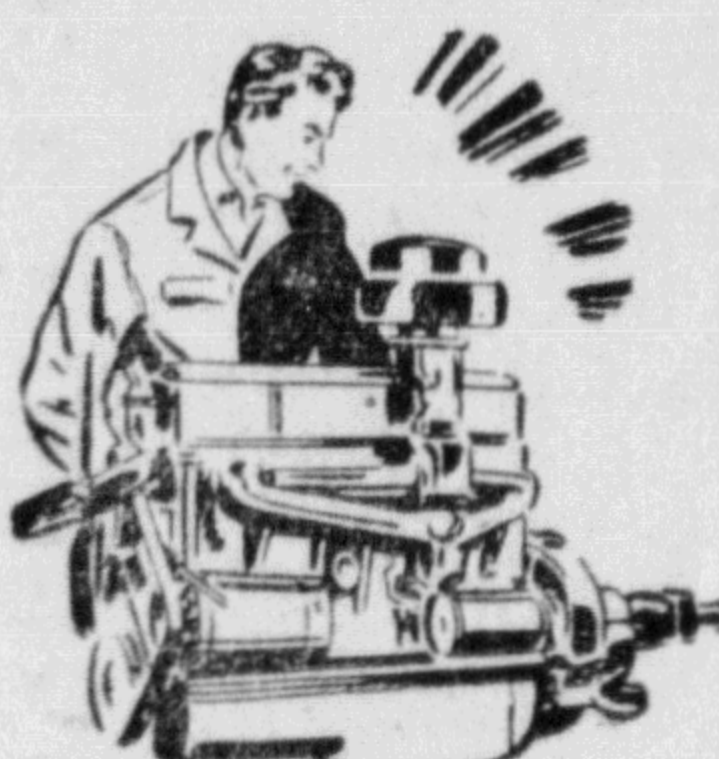

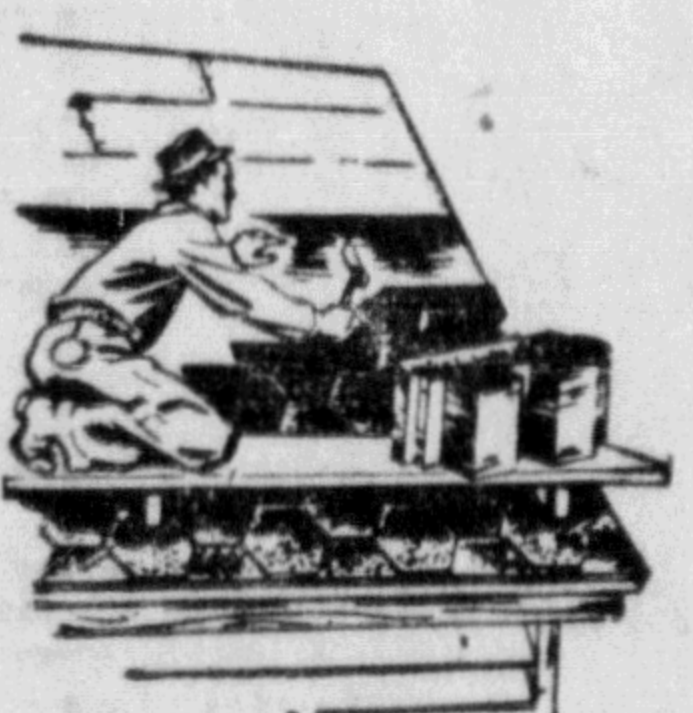

## Annual Barbecue Draws Big Crowd of Visitors

Telkwa's Barbecue, which had its beginning back about 1912 and has been an annual event each Labor Day since then, with the exception of a few of the war years, was renewed on Monday and it was a good day.

The people in Telkwa were all busy. The Catholic Women's League was busy dispensing cold drinks, fruit and novelties. The Telkwa Women's Institute supplied the hot dogs, coffee and ice cream and looked after the Horticultural Fair.

It took all the men available to look after the gate through which passed over five hundred cars and an approximate eighteen hundred people, to park the cars without confusion, to manage the rodeo and dish up the barbecued beef at noon.

The current fine weather held after a heavy shower on Saturday which settled the dust, and both Sunday and Monday were beautiful days — sunny and warm.

On Sunday evening, the celebration opened with a baseball game between the Smithers and Telkwa Junior teams, which was won by Telkwa 12-8.

A large crowd gathered to watch the ritual of placing the beef in the pits later in the evening. The burning coals were shovelled out of the rock-lined pits, the beef, eight quarters of it weighing over eleven hundred pounds, was lowered into the pits on sheets of steel, then the pits were well covered over, sealed, the glowing coals placed back on top and fresh fuel added to start up the fires which were watched and kept burning all night.

During the morning, while the judges were busy at the Horticultural building, a program of children's sports was run off under the efficient management of Father Paul Sanschagrin and Fred Romanuk. At noon the barbecued beef was lifted from the pits, juicy and beautifully tender and was served out to the public by a host of white-robed carvers. At this time the Horticultural building was opened to the public and sharp at 2 p.m. the rodeo commenced, continuing till late in the afternoon.

A few of the horses were not overly inclined to make a show of bucking but others more than made up for these and there were some fine displays of riding. The steers must have been frisky stock for they put on a fine show.

Following the rodeo, there was a balgame between the Telkwa Senior team and Moricetown. Despite fine pitching for Moricetown by Bill Robinson, the Telkwa team won with a score of 4-1.

A dense crowd again gathered in the evening for the fireworks which were let off on top of the tower hill and were watched by the crowds on the front street which was a solid mass of cars. Following this, the young fry

## SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

CPR (Frank Waterhouse-chartered) freighter Yukon Princess, Capt. Campbell, arrived in port at 7 p.m. Saturday from Vancouver and, after a day in port here unloading general cargo, left late yesterday afternoon for Watson Island. From there she will proceed north to Kincolith, Alice Arm, Stewart and Skagway.

Having been delayed by stormy weather on Queen Charlotte Islands, Union steamer Coquitlam, Capt. William McCombe, arrived in port at 10 o'clock last evening from Skidegate and Cumshewa Inlet points and sailed a couple of hours later in continuation of her voyage to Vancouver.

Having been relieved of some of the heavy freights which she
