It all comes down to the heat. The weather is just about unbearable. However, there is another way to look at it. Those who call Southern California home feel comfortable enough for they have become used to the climate.

"Next time I go," remarked Mr. Sampson, "it will be in winter. That's quite safe for any northerner."

The average for living costs is higher than what it is in British Columbia.

People, learning anyone is from Skeena, are quick to inquire about the aluminum and cellulose developments. The publicity it is building up has never been equalled before.

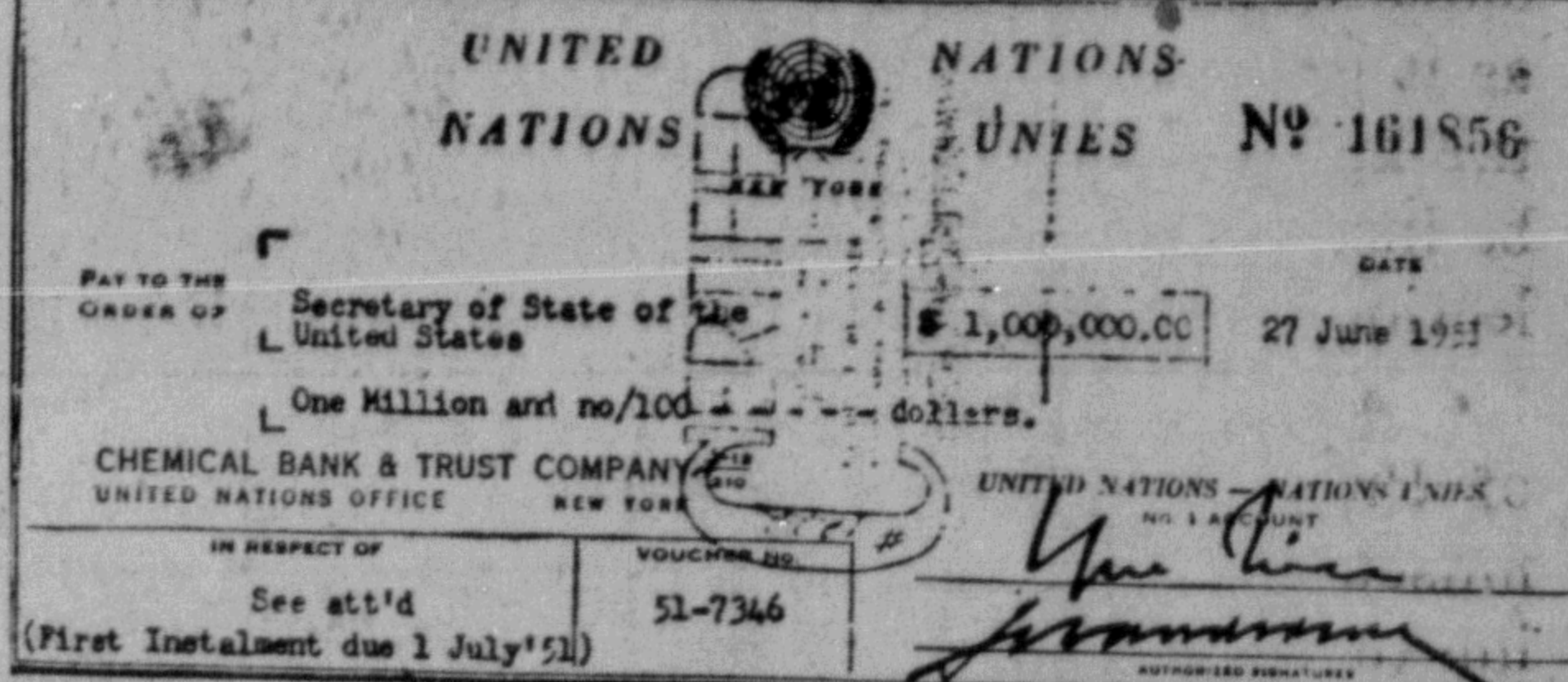
