Mrs. Frank Lockwood sailed on the Camosun last evening for a visit to Stewart.

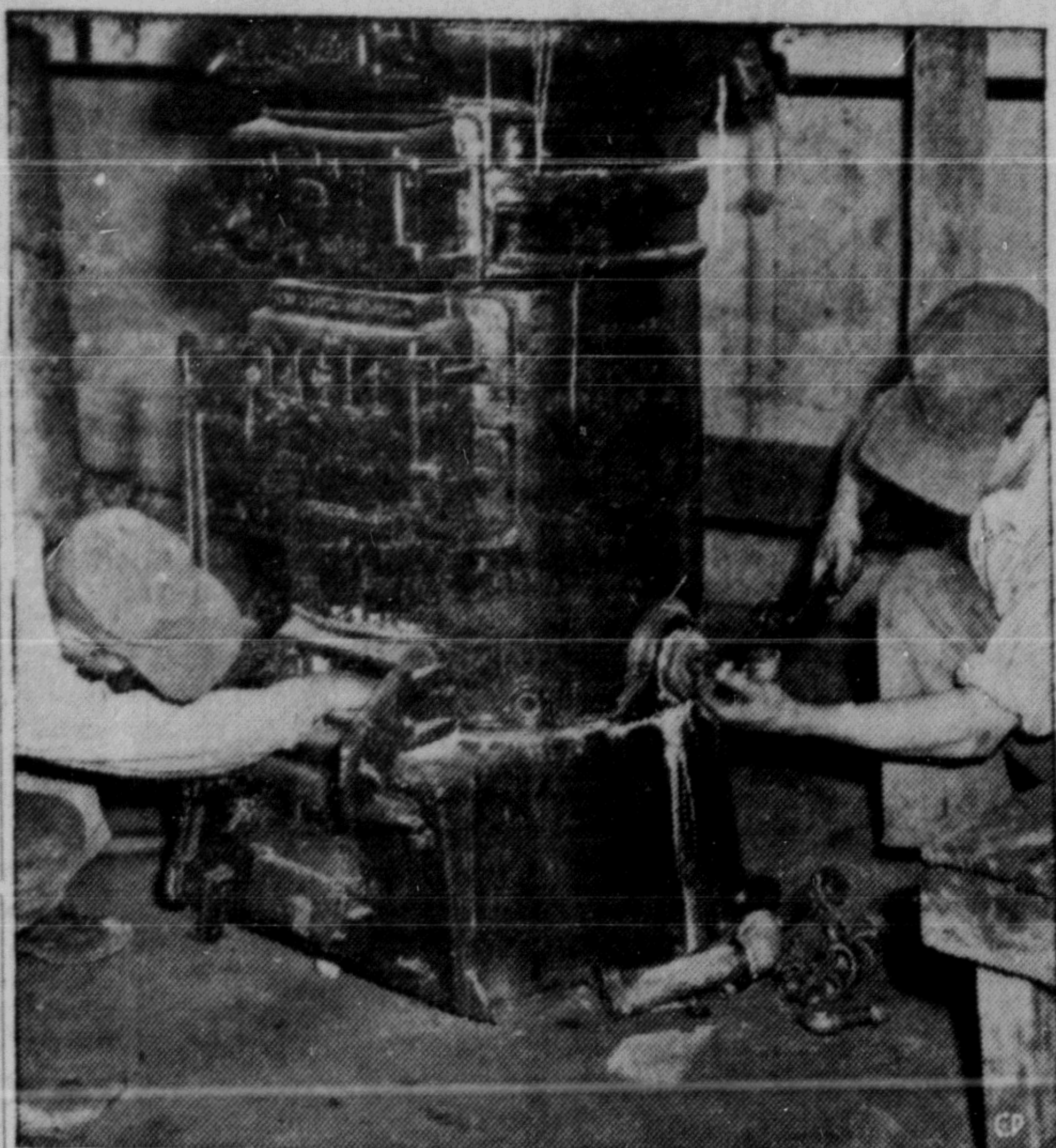

Former Mayor Of Vancouver Visits North

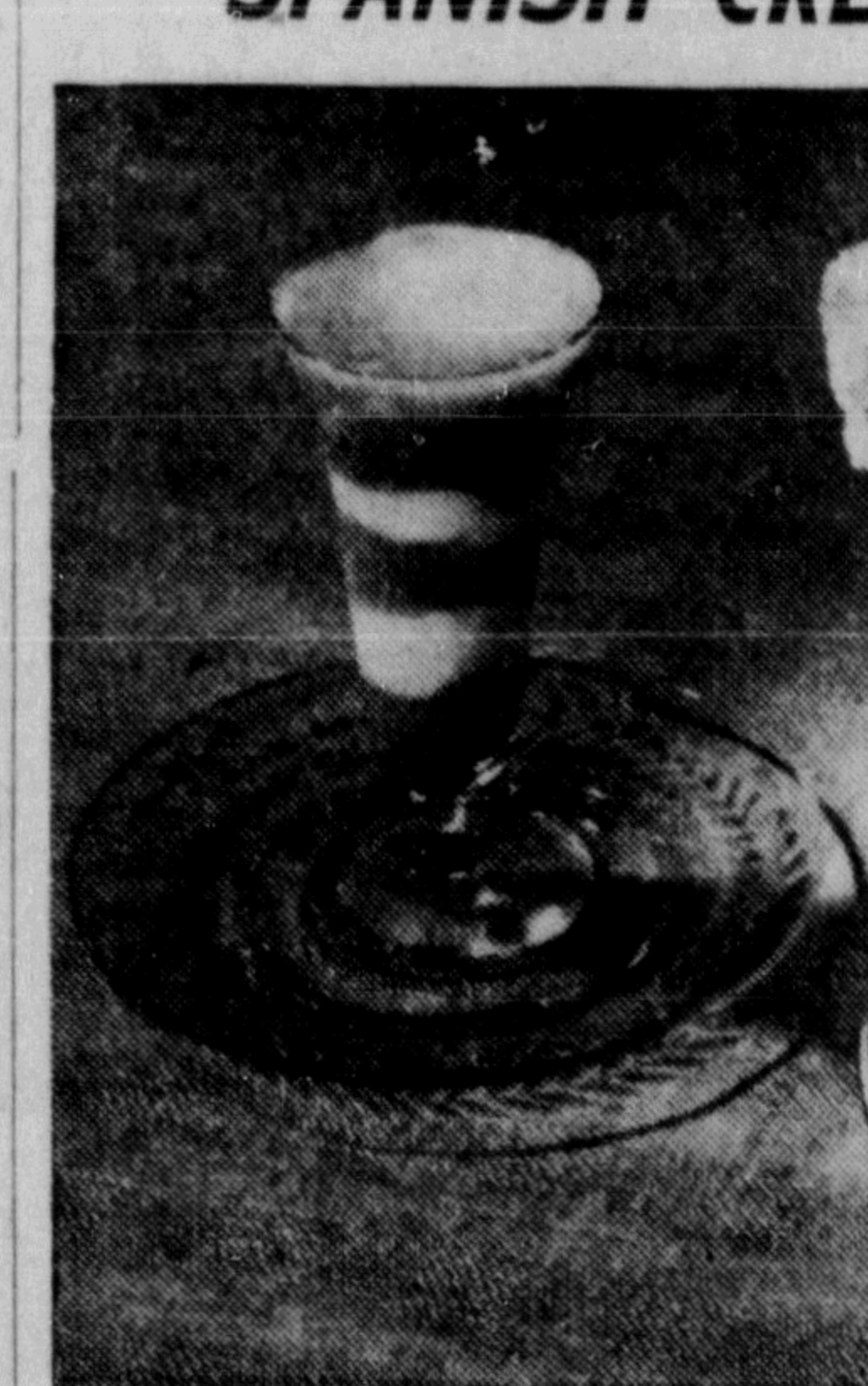

SPANISH CREAM PARFAIT



Strained baby foods, the kind you buy in drug and grocery store baby food departments, can be used to make a variety of delightfully cool summer treats. One of the most tempting is Spanish Cream Parfait, an attractive dessert which will make all the family ask for more.

- 1 tablespoon gelatin
 - 2 cups milk
 - 2 eggs, separated
 - 3 tablespoons sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 can strained peaches
 - 1 can strained apple juice
 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 tablespoon sugar
- Soak gelatin in 1/2 cup of the milk. Scald remainder of milk, then add gelatin, stirring until gelatin is dissolved. Combine

slightly beaten egg yolks with sugar, salt, and vanilla, then add slowly to milk and gelatin. Chill until mixture hardens. Beat with a rotary beater until soft. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into custard mixture. Combine strained peaches and apple sauce, lemon juice, sugar, blending thoroughly. Place gelatin mixture and peach-apple sauce alternately into tall glasses. Chill. Yield: 6 parfait glasses.
