Lakes District Mourns Pioneer
BURNS LAKE—The funeral of the late Olaf A. Halverson was held from the United Church here on Sunday. Rev. Robert McPhie officiating. The church was crowded to the doors with sorrowing friends. Beautiful floral tributes covered the casket and overflowed the chancel.
The whole of the Lakes district was represented and the Francois Lake ferry made a special trip through the drift ice to permit the many friends of the Halverson family, who live in the most remote parts of the Lakes district, to pay their last tributes to the memory of one of the most highly thought of timber men in the district.
Deceased was a popular and active member of the Burns Lake Lodge of Elks, and all honorary pallbearers were chosen from the members, who attended in full regalia, the burial service of the order concluding the ceremony at the Elks' plot in the cemetery.
The untimely death of Olaf Halverson brought sadness to all as he had just concluded a successful career and disposed of all his interests preparatory to taking his family on a trip to Norway.
He was born at Brunkenberg, Norway in 1903, came to Canada in 1926, and for convenience dropped the hitherto historic family name of Amankas.
He married Louise Juanita Channell at McBride in 1931 and leaves his daughter, Vivian Bernice, born at McBride in 1933.
He was struck by the revolving propeller of his combination snowmobile and lake-boat, which resulted in his death shortly after the accident.
It is just one year since Mr. Halverson and his wife crashed through the rotting ice of Babine Lake in a snow-plane. Mrs. Halverson dragged her husband ashore after he had been chilled to helplessness.
